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

(A PASTOR'S STORY)



## Question:

“HOW SHOULD CHRISTIANS RESPOND TO THE ‘WAR ON CHRISTMAS’?”

## Answer:

**M**any people perceive a modern-day “war on Christmas” being waged in the public square. Those who believe in the reality of a war on Christmas see a concerted effort to eliminate the word Christmas from public discourse. Stories confirming a war on Christmas seem to be coming more frequently: a grade-school choir sings “We Wish You a Happy Holiday” instead of “We Wish You a Merry Christmas” for their “Winter Concert.” A library invites “holiday displays” from the community provided the displays have no religious connotation—the stable may have animals in it, but no people. And major shopping chains forbid their employees from wishing anyone a “Merry Christmas.” It is possible to do all one’s Christmas shopping and never see or hear the word Christmas in the stores.

Of course, there’s nothing wrong with saying “Happy Holidays” or “Season’s Greetings.” But if someone says “Happy Holidays” for the sole purpose of not saying “Merry Christmas,” then we are right to question what’s going on. Is there truly be a cultural “war on Christmas?” “Why is the word Christmas censored?” we wonder as we wander through the malls. Why do some public schools celebrate everything from Kwanzaa to Labafana the Christmas witch, and ban the Nativity, all in the name of “inclusion” and “tolerance”?

One reason put forward by those seeking to avoid the word Christmas is that it offends non-Christians. But, according to a recent Gallup poll, only 3 percent of adults in America say it bothers them when a store makes specific reference to Christmas. This fact gives the “war on Christmas” a more sinister twist. The exclusion of Christmas is less about sensitivity and more about censorship. Expunging all mention of Christmas from society is not

really a way to “adapt” to a more diverse culture but a way to engineer a more secular culture.

Many times, the arguments against Christmas programs and displays are couched in political terms, but the bias against Christmas goes much deeper than that. The war on Christmas is primarily a spiritual battle, not a political one.

How should Christians respond to the war on Christmas and the ubiquitous use of “Happy Holidays” to the exclusion of “Merry Christmas”? Here are some suggestions:

**1) Celebrate Christmas!** War on Christmas or not, let the joy of the season show in your life. Teach your family the significance of Jesus’ birth and make the Christmas traditions meaningful in your home.

**2) Wish others a Merry Christmas.** When confronted with a “Happy Holidays,” get specific and wish the greeter a “Merry Christmas!” You may be surprised at how many respond in kind. Even if you’re met with resistance, don’t let it dampen your cheer. In Dickens’ A Christmas Carol, Ebenezer Scrooge wages a personal war on Christmas, and his nephew feels the brunt of his uncle’s attacks year after year, but it doesn’t stop him from wishing his humbug of an uncle a Merry Christmas and inviting Scrooge to Christmas dinner.

**3) Speak the truth in love (Ephesians 4:15).** The Christmas season is a wonderful opportunity to share Christ’s love and the gospel message. He is the reason for the season!

**4) Pray for those in positions of power (1 Timothy 2:1–3).** Pray for wisdom. Pray for revival so that Christmas, instead of being “offensive,” would be honored by all. May we each be a peaceful warrior in the cultural war on Christmas.

“Mrs. Quesenbury, you’re going to have a baby,” the doctor announced.” What? No! That can’t be! Those were my thoughts. What I actually said was: “I already have a baby.” He smiled and said: “It looks very much like you are going to have another one.” Clearly, he did not understand. So, I explained that I was the Texas State WMA President (I knew he would be impressed!) with places to go and people to see, and that I was also planning a trip to the Holy Land next summer. He had to know that this would not be a good year for me to have a baby. What was the doctor thinking?

Actually, what was I thinking? And where was this loud, demanding voice coming from? Surely not from me! I’m the one who never wants to say anything foolish or look dumb, and this sounded a lot like someone who had just scored big on both points! It definitely did not sound like me. And yet it was!

For almost six years I had prayed to hear these words. Now all I could think about was my four-month-old baby at home. Our prayers had already been answered! And it was this same doctor who began the process when he suggested we consider adoption. We considered it. We also prayed and felt this was God’s answer. And six months later we welcomed our precious six day old baby boy into our hearts and into our home. More good news! The adoption agent had enthusiastically agreed to help us find a brother or sister for John when we were ready. A perfect plan with a happy ending!

So, what happened? I had prayed for one baby—not two! And certainly not in 13 months! Here’s what happened. My not-so-perfect plan had just been snatched away from this overwrought, controlling mom by a loving God who had a PERFECT plan. It didn’t take long for this truth to settle into my heart, for Scripture to flood my mind, and for the rejoicing to begin. Somehow I knew we would survive. But not without one more big surprise!

When baby David was 3 weeks old, I was back in the hospital—this time for an emergency appendectomy. This wasn’t my plan either. But with no major problems I was soon back home with a new resolve to tackle the task in front of me. Determination I had, but the energy I needed was nowhere to be found. Our first night home brought that clearly into focus. Was this my new life? Two hungry, crying babies, a barking dog who did not understand her recent “home invasion,” and piles of dirty laundry on the floor by the sofa where I lay feeling sorry for myself. As I pondered my new NORMAL, a sudden knock at the door jarred me back to the present.

## The gift that gives back

A fixed amount of income for the remainder of their life

Part of the annual income received is tax free

The following are examples of rates a donor can expect for a single life annuity:

Age	Rate
65	4.7%
75	5.8%
85	7.8%

The fixed payments you receive are backed by the general resources of the National Christian Foundation and are typically reinsured. Reinsurance not only provides you with a higher level of certainty payments will continue for life, it also provides various BMA ministries the option to benefit from the charitable gift annuity at the onset as opposed to the time of the donor’s death.

Since gifts to the BMA Foundation are never spent and the annual earnings are distributed to various BMA ministries, proceeds from a Charitable Gift Annuity will help spread the gospel around the world until the Lord returns.

## Lifeword Blessings in 2016

**B**MA churches have been a great blessing to Lifeword during the 2016 Lifeword Sunday season, and we are very grateful for those who have given so generously to the ministry.

For pastors who registered their churches for Lifeword Sunday and sent in their contributions by Monday, Dec. 12, there will be a drawing for a 60-inch TV on Wednesday, Dec. 14 at 11 a.m. on Facebook Live.

Because of the support partnership of BMA churches and their members, four languages have been added this year, bringing the total language count to forty and the total program count to fifty-nine. (There were thirty-six languages and fifty programs at the end of 2015. The following languages, broadcast areas, and programs have been added in 2016:

Vietnamese—Lifeword Community Radio (LCR) broadcast in Phnom Penh, heard in Cambodia and Vietnam and called *Children for the Great Commission*

Jarai—broadcast heard in Vietnam and Cambodia and called *The Rich Earth*

Swahili—broadcast heard in Tanzania, Kenya, Rwanda and Burundi (98% Muslim area) and called *Word of Life*

Leemeh—LCR broadcast heard in West Africa (99.9% Muslim area with fewer than twenty-five known believers)

New formats added in 2016 were a Fante-language (Ghana) program, a Khmer-language Bible reading format and the “Day by Day” Facebook daily devotional. Also, twelve new Lifeword Community Radio stations were installed in Asia, Africa, and Central and South America.

Please join us as we praise the Lord for his provision through Walk and Lifeword Sunday giving, and join us in prayer for wisdom as we seek his will in other opportunities to spread the gospel.

## Activate workshop held at Farley Street

**T**aking the local church on a journey to discover “who she is, where she is, and where God wants to take (her)” spells out one of the main thrusts of a relatively new program in BMA work, sponsored by DiscipleGuide of Conway, Ark., designed to assist the local church in leadership, organization, outreach and a myriad of other issues confronting the church.

Todd West, pastor of the Oasis, Maumell, Ark. and Larry Barker, pastor of Cornerstone, Jacksonville, Texas were the facilitators of this workshop, held at Farley Street, Waxahachie Nov. 29, 2016 and was attended by 30-35 pastors and church leaders from several Texas local associations, one pastor from Oklahoma and one from Michigan. Heith Mitchell, director of missions for the BMA of Texas and some of his church planters were on hand for this workshop.

“We need to develop a greater awareness of where we are as a church,” West said. “Until that happens, nothing will get done. This program is not just for churches that are about to close their doors, but churches that desire to be more healthy.”

All churches and pastors are encouraged to use the tools provided by the program as an aid to leadership and vision casting.

Clinton Everitt, who, for 23 years, has led the Beacon Baptist Church, Bryan, has been actively involved in the Activate program for his church.

“One of the great benefits of taking my church through this initiative is that I no longer have to push anymore,” he said. It has caused me to discover that God could work on the hearts of our members too — as well as the pastor’s.”

Everitt added that since Beacon has been doing the program, the church has a clearer idea of where they need to go for the future.

Texas church planter Darren Lemons agreed, saying the program has caused his people to “buy in” to the ministry.

“Our church has changed from one which is totally led by the (church planters) to a church being led by the total church,” Lemons said. “Now, every Sunday, we celebrate not only the ministries our people are conducting within the fellowship, but ministry they are doing ‘outside’ the church.”

One of the many issues Activate guides pastors and churches into is the Church Lifecycle, which consists of three primary stages; From initial organization, the church experiences incline, recline and decline. When the church continues to decline without a ministry to reverse the trend, the church will eventually close her doors.

Another aspect of the Activate ministry is what West called the “Pastor’s Huddle.” Pastors in local associations, or pastors who are within driving distance of each other meet together for mutual encouragement.

“These pastor’s huddles are not for the purpose talking about problems, but finding solutions.” West said. “One such pastor’s huddle is done electronically for pastors who live in fringe areas to meet together periodically, on line.”

West said Everitt is the facilitator for this internet pastor’s huddle.

## A successful pastor

I love being a pastor. It's not only my calling, but my passion for over thirty-five years. I also love pastors. Being a pastor, especially in today's culture is not easy. Over the years, I've had young men ask me what it takes to be a successful pastor of a large church. I tell them it is the same thing for any size church: Jesus. While the success of a good pastor can never be measured by numbers, here are some things that can help us be effective in ministry.

**Love your congregation unconditionally.** If they know you genuinely love them, they will overlook a plethora of mistakes and inexperience.

**Make sermon preparation and delivery a priority.** Start planning your sermons months in advance. As Joe Pendleton, my preaching professor at the BMA seminary once said, "Never tell your people that you didn't have enough time to study, because once you open your mouth, they will know."

**Model Christian living.** Letting others see how Christ lived, by watching your life, is more effective than any sermon.

**Don't be lazy.** Every morning, even if you work from home, set a time to go "to work." Then stick to your schedule faithfully.

**Seek and then share God's vision for your church.** Let God set your agenda. Always remember, He wants every church to succeed.

**Lead like Christ.** Jesus wasn't a dictator. He led by picking up a towel and water basin. Like Jesus, be a servant leader.

**Learn from criticism.** No one is perfect, including pastors. Criticism can be a great tool for personal and pastoral growth.

**Laugh often.** The work of the ministry is demanding, but don't let it rob you of your joy. People love to be around people of joy.

**Be a lifelong learner.** The only time we stop learning is when we die; meanwhile, get as much education as you can.

**Be real and transparent.** Whenever people see you are just like them, they will give you a hearing. Let them in on your struggles.

**Be a prayer warrior.** Your greatest asset is your prayer life. Just as Jesus needed time alone with the Father, so do you.

**Be a soul winner.** The Great Commission commands

reaching people with the gospel. Never expect more from your people, than you are willing to do yourself.

**Train leaders.** Your effectiveness is multiplied when you involve others in your ministry.

**Cherish your family.** Never sacrifice your family, even for ministry. If you should gain the world and lose your family, you are still a failure.

## Be a generous church

**2** Cor. 9:15 gives us one of the richest statements in scripture; “Thanks be to God for His indescribable gift.” Christmas is all about the greatest gift ever given. The word indescribable literally means too wonderful for words. The words in this verse are the concluding comments of chapters eight and nine. They tell the story of the generosity of a people who display their appreciation through their generosity. This unspeakable gift is the basis, foundation, and motivation for all Christian giving.

Your church is never more like Jesus than when you live generous lives. Every church is there to help people find and follow Jesus. Notice the “helping people!” True biblical prosperity equals generosity. When Paul was headed to Jerusalem with a love offering from the believers in Macedonia and Achaia he said they were pleased to make a contribution to the poor. They were not just willing but saw it as a blessing and privilege to help. They were thrilled to have an opportunity to be a blessing.

We need to be mindful of those who may struggle during the holidays. This time of the year is wonderful but to many it reminds them of their loneliness, their losses, and their lack of hope. They need a little extra giving of our time and attention. Their hearts are breaking and they should not have to face this season alone. We can be generous with our love, encouragement, prayers, and other expressions of kindness. They need to be reminded that they may struggle and suffer for a season but God’s purposes will prevail.

We must make sure our motives are pure in our generosity. What we do is very important but why we do it is even more important. Remember, God loves a cheerful giver who gives out of their appreciation for Him as the indescribable gift. Paul told the Corinthians that the key to their giving was their eagerness and had nothing to do with how much they had. The Gentile believers felt a debt to the Jews who had brought the gospel to them. Generosity to others comes out of His generosity to us.

Here are some things to consider, as your church desires to be a generous church.

**First, make sure you are not defined by what you have but rather by what you give.** People see our nice buildings and wonder if we have placed too much emphasis on what we possess rather than how we can help those who are less fortunate. There is nothing wrong with nice things but materialism can cause so much focus on what we have that we are then unable to focus on helping others. Do people see your church as a generous church?

**Second, make sure you are not defined by how much you**



**give but by your willingness to give.** Corinthians 8:12 says, “... it is acceptable according to what one has, not according to what he does not have.” The principle is not equal amount but equal willingness. God does not ask us to give what we do not have. It is not about the size of the gift but the size of your heart in doing what you can to help others. Proverbs 3:27 says, “When it is in your power, don’t withhold good from the one it belongs to.”

**Third, make sure you are not defined by what you do personally but by how it glorifies God.** If you do it for recognition or to be noticed, you already have your reward. God blesses it the most when we do not care who gets the credit. You should be more concerned about Jesus getting the credit than you or your church. We are not in a competition with other churches but rather with the devil. Praise the Lord when someone turns to Christ because the love of Christ was displayed to him or her in a practical way.

**Fourth, make sure you are not defined by how you look but by how you live.** If you are going to help people you will have to help them where they are and that can be very messy. They are often broken and looking for someone who cares about them. People want to know that you are real and authentic without pretense. They are not impressed by outward appearances that are not backed up by your daily practices. Matthew 6:1 says, “Be careful not to practice your righteousness in front of people to be seen by them.”

**Fifth, let’s not be defined by a tight grip but by an open hand.** Your church should always be eager to help and ready to respond to the needs of others. Sometimes we hold on too tightly to what God has given to us. God told Abram in Gen. 12:2, “I will make you into a great nation, I will bless you, I will make your name great and you will be a blessing.” You are blessed so that you will be a blessing to others. Open your hands and see what God has given your church in order that you might bless your community.

Your church may say it values lost people and wants to be a blessing to the people in your area but that must be backed up by regular practices that show you really do care. It is not just monetary but is a combination of investing your time, talents, and treasures. God is not asking you to give out of what you do not have but instead is looking to see if we are eagerly excited to be generous with what He has entrusted into our hands. Live with open hands and do not hold on too tightly!

Healthy churches are always generous churches!

# 116th Annual Session OF THE BMA OF TEXAS CONCLUDES IN WAXAHACHIE

The 116th Annual Session of the BMA of Texas was held at Farley Street, Waxahachie Nov. 13-14. BMA of Texas President Wes Pratt preached a challenging message titled the same as the meeting's theme, "Following Jesus, Focusing on Others."

Three new churches petitioned the association including Emmanuel, San Antonio; Olde Tyme, White Oak and Bible, Robert Lee.

## WOMEN'S MISSIONARY AUXILIARY



# Conference on Hispanic Ministries

The Leadership Conference held in conjunction with the Baptist Missionary Association of Texas, Nov. 14, dealt with the Hispanic ministry, under the auspices of our BMA Texas Missions, headed up by Heith Mitchell.

Arnulfo Maldonado, who is the Hispanic Ministry Coordinator for our state work, along with Michael Hight, who is the Hispanic Coordinator for the national association, facilitated the conference Tuesday morning of the association, held at Farley Street, Waxahachie.

The general thrust of the seminar was to encourage local churches to begin a Hispanic ministry in their local area.

“My goal is to eventually have a Hispanic congregation in every city in Texas,” Maldonado said. “It is an honor and privilege to be a part of this movement — I put about 31,000 miles on my car each year visiting churches, and I hope to partner with them in this movement.”

Maldonado spoke in a video shown to the group, saying he can see future “multi-language” church plants wherever he travels.

He spoke briefly of his experience of being called to this ministry.

“It was while I was attending the seminary in Jacksonville, and studying the English language, that the Holy Spirit laid it on my heart to reach my people with the gospel,” he said.

Michael Hight shared the different models of Hispanic ministry an Anglo church can be involved in, citing the “Rent-a-Church” system where an established church only rents their facilities out to a Hispanic group but has little or no hands-on responsibilities to the group.

“The rent-a-church model is probably the easiest one to do, but it’s not the most effective,” said Hight.

He also mentioned the other models — Anglo church partnering with the Hispanic group serving together as co-laborers; then the Anglo parenting church, where the Anglo church is truly linked in to the Hispanic ministry; and finally, the blended service ministry, where both groups worship and minister together.

“There are no guarantees — the devil fights all these mission works,” Hight said. “To have an effective ministry, it begins at the top with strong pastoral leadership, and strong pastoral cooperation between the Hispanic and Anglo pastors. When this happens, conflict can be avoided.”

He said that it is important that people be empowered to claim ownership in this ministry, but often this is difficult for the sponsoring church because of feeling uncomfortable with the ministry.

Hight cites a need for the sponsoring church to be patient, especially when dealing with the reality of cultural differences between the two groups.

“There are going to be some difficulties, and that is okay,” he assured his audience, adding that Caucasians have to recognize the fact they have been grounded and schooled in ministry in ways other cultures have not.

## UNIQUE MULTI-CULTURAL MINISTRY IN NORTH HOUSTON

During the Hispanic ministry session, Dean Renfro, lead pastor of Suburban Woods Baptist Church located in Humble, and church member Richard Murray, shared their ministry.

Like many urban congregations, which once flourished in a predominately white area, Suburban Woods experienced the “white flight” phenomenon, and found themselves torn between moving out, or reaching the culture(s) that were locating in their area.

Renfro, who has many years of church planting, church restart and church consulting, was sent to Suburban Woods for basically a “restart” ministry.

“We were in a disastrous situation,” said Murray, noting that facilities were run down and needed much rebuilding and repair.

The leadership discovered that the Hispanics had many men who were skilled in construction, and their talents were put to good use in refurbishing the facilities.

As a result of their outreach in the area, five congregations meet at different times during Sunday and some during the week. Groups are Anglo, Hispanics (Mexico) Central Americans, South Americans, and a Puerto Rico group.

“We have a combined attendance of over 200 each week,” said Murray.

Recently there were 10 professions of faith from the different groups, and to his surprise and delight, Renfro (the lead pastor over all groups) said each group wanted him to baptize each of them. Hight is planning a forum in the near future to try to discover how his department can partner with local congregations and hopefully chart a path.

“We want to help churches in this process, and we have put a team together to help walk churches through the process,” he said.

# Todd West gives tips on how to avoid pastoral burnout

Selecting 1 Kings 18 for his basis, Todd West, shared principles, using the experiences of Elijah, to help pastors who are suffering from burnout and other hazards associated with the ministry.

West is the founding pastor of Oasis Church, Maumelle, Ark. and also a ministry consultant for DiscipleGuide. He spoke to a group of pastors during the annual BMA of Texas meeting, held at Farley Street, Waxahachie.

West cited some “triggers” that contributed to burnout, including fear, exhaustion, fatigue, disappointment.

“Another thing to be careful of are mountaintop experiences,”

West told his audience. “Sometimes we have a hard time managing ourselves on the mountaintop.”

He noted that one of the great hazards of being on the mountaintop is the danger of becoming addicted to adrenaline — always seeking for the mountaintop experiences.

One of the warning signs of burnout is isolation.

“Some preachers say, ‘well, I’m just not going to get involved anymore—I’m going to stay home and take care of my people,’” West said, pointing out that many pastors withdraw.

Another sign of burnout is what West called a loss of reality.

“You can walk up to a pastor and ask him how things are going in his church—and he answered, ‘Never been better—we’re doing wonderful’—and I know good and well that’s not the case—I can just ask some of his church members and get the truth.”

He expressed the need for the pastor to “recharge” himself—and one way is through rest.

“You know, I remember some of the older generation of

preachers went home in the afternoon and took a nap,” he said. “What I do often is go home for lunch, and then I like to sit back and watch Gunsmoke.”

He explained that different pastors have different ways to rest.

“Some like to take a nap—others like to get out on their motorcycle, while others like to work in the garden, or take mini-vacations,” he said. “Whatever method you use to rest, remember, it’s a time to recharge.”

One of the ways to avoid burnout is what West referred to as the “release.”

“I’m talking about getting honest with God,” he said. “Elijah told the Lord in 1 Kings 19:10 exactly how he felt.”

He then encouraged the men to refocus and get back to what they’ve been called to do.

# Falwell, Bisagno and Jolly speak at first ever Baptist Progress Ministry Connection Conference

**J**onathan Falwell, pastor of Thomas Road Baptist Church in Lynchburg, Virginia; Dr. John Bisagno, retired pastor of First Baptist Church in Houston and Jerry Jolly, pastor of Fairview Baptist Church in Jonesboro, Arkansas each brought inspiring messages from God's Word at the first Baptist Progress Ministry Connection Conference during the 116th Annual Session of the BMA of Texas. The meeting, held at Farley Street, Waxahachie, was a highlight of the annual session.

Falwell speaking from Galatians 5:14-26, said that following Jesus and focusing on others—the theme of the meeting—joy should be experienced by Christians, but some allow circumstances, situations, conflicts etc., to crowd out any room for joy. He said, “The focus is on here rather than on Him!”

“The book of Galatians was written by Paul to encourage believers to let go of the burdens of the past and of sin and cling to the freedom that comes from Christ. As a result of living in this way, all will be able to experience the joy that Christ came to give,” he said.

He urged those in attendance to speak, walk and act in love, and thereby experience joy. He encouraged everyone to allow the fruit of the Spirit to be evident in their lives and to remember that they belong to Christ and should strive to point others to Him.”

Bisagno, speaking primarily to ministers said, “Many who enter the ministry do not last,” Bisagno said. He said “hundreds of ministers from various Christian denominations leave the ministry every month and that only a minority of seminary graduates will remain in the ministry eight years after graduation.”

Those who quit the battle or find themselves disqualified, he said, and subject America and

the world to an ever-quickening spiritual decline—a decline that he said has led Islam, Mormonism and the occult to become the first, second and third fastest growing religions in the United States, respectively.

The decline of Christianity and the disappearance of those once committed to the ministry do not have to continue, Bisagno said. He offered four areas of focus: moral issues, money, people and a realistic understanding of success in ministry.

As for moral issues, Bisagno told ministers to guard their eyes, love their wives and maintain correctly ordered priorities. Concerning money, he said to follow Matthew 6:33 in seeking first the Kingdom of the Lord before anything else. Specifically, he told them not to touch church money and never to discuss the amount of an honorarium or salary.

Discussing people, Bisagno challenged pastors to be wary of the legalists, the faithless, the doubtful and the “self-appointed church bosses.” He counseled pastors to remember their commonality, avoid their discouragement and not to respond combatively. Instead, listen closely and lead wisely, he said.

Through it all ministers must finish the fight and finish it well, Bisagno said.

Jerry Jolly spoke of the Master of ministry, the Lord Jesus Christ. Speaking from Psalm 23, Jolly said that the Good Shepherd guides, provides and protects His servants. He shared a personal experience of how the Lord has done these things for Him following his wife's death over a year ago.

Also part of the conference was national recording group Brian Free and Assurance. They were a crowd favorite as they sang songs from their new album, timeless classics as well as award -winning hits such as “Say Amen.”

# Sunday School Lessons

## Are you haughty or humble

**DATE:** January 1, 2017

**TEXT:** Luke 18:9-14

No greater rebuke was ever conferred upon any person by the Savior, Himself than when He was addressing the pharisees.

They were steeped in the rituals of the old law, they were dismissive of Christ as the Messiah, they were self-satisfied, and they were condescending to others.

In our text, Luke 18:9-14, Jesus draws some stark comparisons between an “unworthy” publican (tax collector). He was hated by society, and furthermore, he had a realistic view of himself.

The pharisees were both politically and religiously astute in society. They were proud, they trusted in themselves, and were self righteous. They lauded their ability to give tithes and “pray” regularly.

But their prayers were boastful and ceremonial. It is interesting to see who the pharisee was praying to. (verse 11) He prayed to himself. He was not addressing God. He was what one might view as a first century humanist. Humanists deny embracing religion, but humanism is a religion - a religion of self-worship. Such was, in reality, the religion of the pharisees.

The tax collector, on the other hand, possessed a broken spirit, an accurate view of his own wickedness, and a deep sense of sin and unworthiness. He did not lift his eyes up to Heaven, but pleaded for God’s mercy.

The tax collector became justified in God’s sight -- not the self-righteous pharisee.

Jesus explained in Matthew 18:2-3 that it is the pure, simple, humble faith of a little child that enters into God’s Kingdom.

### APPLICATION:

Hebrews 11:6 says, “But without faith it is impossible to please him: for he that cometh to God must believe that he is, and that he is a rewarder of them that diligently seek him. That pertains not only to saving faith, but in the way we live. To embark upon trying to serve the Lord in the energy of the flesh, is to have the same faithlessness as the pharisee. But to truly please the Father, one must be an empty vessel, and have a broken spirit -- then God will use us.

The pharisee was not seeking God -- he was basking in his own self-made goodness. The publican knew he was nothing -- and he went away justified, and a part of God’s Kingdom.

## The wheat and the weeds

**TEXT:** Matthew 13:24-30; 36-43

The most visible manifestation of the Kingdom of God is illustrated in the New Testament Church.

According to Matthew 13:37, Jesus Christ is the Planter of the good seed. (Matthew 16:18 “And I say also unto thee, That thou art Peter, (petros-a tiny pebble) and upon this rock (petra- the Foundational Stone) I will build my church; and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it.”

Verse 25 - The enemy (Satan) has always had an agenda of infiltrating God’s Kingdom

Verse 29 - The uprooting of the weeds will also uproot the wheat also. One may ask if this contradicts Jesus’s formula for church discipline in Matthew 18. Church discipline is for the purpose of correcting the saints who stray off course. Paul referred to two men, Hymenaeus and Alexander in 1 Timothy 1:20 whom he cast out of the church “that they may learn not to blaspheme.” Church discipline is for the edification of the wayward member of God’s Kingdom. If they truly belong to the Lord, the Holy Spirit living in them will not let them tolerate being separate from the fellowship - they will seek restoration.

Tares, or weeds, never belonged to God. According to Hebrews 12:8 God does not engage in disciplining those that are not His own. “But if ye be without

chastisement, whereof all are partakers, then are ye bastards (illegitimate children) and not sons.”

One day, God will sort out the wheat from the tares, during that great harvest at the end of the world. The evil ones (the tares) will be cast into the furnace (eternal torment)

### APPLICATION:

Paul said to the Corinthians, “Let a man examine himself, and so let him eat of that bread, and drink of that cup.” One of the functions of the Lord’s Supper, is not only to remember the shed blood and broken body of Christ on the cross, but for God’s people to examine themselves. John’s first epistle was especially written to believers in order to help us to know that we have passed from death unto life.

- Do you have a hunger in your heart for God and His Word?
- Do you have an unflinching love for the brethren in the fellowship?
- Do you have a sensitivity to sin when it invades your life, and are driven to sorrow and a desire to confess your sin to God?

To answer these questions with certainty can help you to know whether or not you are a wheat or a tare.

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# Sunday School Lessons

## Lost and found

LUKE 15:1-10

In the parable of the lost sheep, the crowd to which Jesus addressed, could not look beyond Jesus's attitude about sitting and eating with sinners. Therefore, they could not comprehend the love the Good Shepherd has for His sheep - and whole-heartedly pursues the lost sheep.

Not only could the pharisees not comprehend Jesus' love for the lost sheep, but His rejoicing in finding the sheep. He calls friends and neighbors to tell them the good news.

And most of all, the Pharisees could not comprehend how there is rejoicing in Heaven over one that repents, much more than over 99 who do not see the need for repentance.

Did you notice the scripture text says "there is joy in the presence of angels of God over one who repents"? (verse 10)

That would be the saints in glory, who experienced redemption. Angels were never in a lost state, therefore, they would not rejoice as the saints would.

Jesus made certain the pharisees understood the

significance by using the parable of the lost coin.

### APPLICATION:

God's people should celebrate every time a lost person comes to the Savior. We should also celebrate our loving Father who aggressively seeks for His lost sheep, and we should be touched by His mercy. Verse 5 says "He layeth it (the sheep) on his shoulders, rejoicing."

We cannot begin to understand the joy of the Lord when a lost sheep is found.

## The cost of compassion

TEXT: Luke 10:25-37

Jesus was always confronted by detractors and those who sought to shrewdly catch Him in an inconsistency -- but could never be debated. And His answers to legalists of that day were through stories that were simple, yet delivering eternal principles.

His answer to the lawyer who tried to de-rail him, was the sum total of the believer's walk -- to "love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy strength, and with all thy mind; and thy neighbor as thyself.

Then Jesus delivered a profound truth about the characteristics of one who loved his neighbor. The Good Samaritan.

Samaritans were despised by the Jews - and the Jews likewise despised by the Samaritans. So it was most unlikely that a Samaritan would stop and render aid to a Jew who had been beaten and robbed while traveling.

1. There was no love exercised by the priest. He saw the plight of the Jew and passed by on the other side of the road. Organized religion is not enough to change one's heart into one of compassion.

2. There was no love exercised by the Levite. Not even one of the victim's own kind -- a Jew, and a descendent of the Levitical priesthood bothered to stop and render aid.

3. But a Samaritan -- Samaritans were despised by the Jews - and the Jews likewise despised by the Samaritans. So it was most unlikely that a Samaritan would stop and render aid to a Jew who had been beaten and robbed while traveling.

But this Samaritan stopped, rendered aid, placed the victim upon his donkey, took him to the nearest hotel, and paid for the care of the man from Jericho.

### APPLICATION

God delights in sending blessing through the most unlikely

means. He did not choose the intellect of Alexandria, or the wealth of Laodicea, or the champions of the Isthmian games to have His gospel spread -- He chose "the foolishness of preaching." 1 Corinthians 1:21 He chose a little lad with five barley buns and two pickled fish to feed thousands. He chose a serial killer, struck him down on the road to Damascus, and made him the most effective planter of New Testament Churches in church history.



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
