Stop raising mules

I'm not a country boy. There, I admitted it. However, I do live in Arkansas, which means I get a few "country boy points" by default. For instance, I know that horses reproduce horses. I also know that donkeys reproduce donkeys. And, for bonus points, I know that a horse and a donkey together produce mules.

Mules are very patient, intelligent and sure-footed. However, mules have a problem: they are sterile creatures. That means that every time you want to add a mule to your pack of mules, you have to mate a horse and donkey. That takes extra work on your part. However, if you own horses, they naturally reproduce on their own. To put it another way, you add mules to your pack by *manual addition*. Every new mule requires you to start from scratch.

However, you can add horses to your team by *automatic multiplication*. New horses can grow a family without necessarily needing a human matchmaker.

Today, the choice between a horse and mule may not seem like a big deal. They both can pull heavy loads and contribute to farm life.

But when it comes to long range planning, the differences between horses and mules are drastic. In 10 years, you could own dozens of horses by investing in a relative few. On the other hand, to have the same amount of mules would cost a much greater investment.

The choice is between addition and multiplication.

The same is true when it comes to the Great Commission of the church. Simply put, Christ did not call for the simple addition of believers. Rather, He calls us to exponential multiplication of disciples. That's the only way we will ever see disciples made of all nations.

Unfortunately, many churches still choose to work by addition. For many it is easier and takes less time and patience. For others it is the only method they have ever known. Admittedly, addition may look like a more fruitful approach today. And evangelism without discipleship may be a quick,

easy way to fill seats right now. But what happens when these people (without a strong foundation of discipleship) leave the church? And what happens when the ones who stay for the long run never evangelize or disciple others because they've never been trained? The addition-based approach, like breeding mules, causes a church to continuously go back to "square one" and never is able to build a strong community of discipleship.

I know what you may be thinking. We all know people who have made disciples within a church of "addition-minded" ministry. I totally agree. Just like Jesus said in Matthew 3:9, God can raise up sons of Abraham from stones; however, it isn't a frequent occurrence.

To be honest (Google it if you don't believe me) in a few rare cases, mules have actually reproduced. But it has only happened 60 times in the past 475 years, not exactly the odds upon which you want to build a multiplication strategy.

That's why intentional discipleship is key to the fulfillment of the Great Commission. It may not always draw the biggest crowds at the beginning, but by investing in a few now, you are much more likely to reach masses in the future.

Questions to help determine whether your ministry is addition-based or multiplication-based include the following:

- Are you raising sterile Christians? (i.e. Do your members make disciples who make disciples?)
- Who are considered the ministers at your church? The staff only, or maturing "lay people" growing in discipleship?
- Is real life-investment taking place in people's lives after conversion?
- Are you seeing transformational change throughout the lifespan of believers?
- Are you "geehawing" with that? (It's a country thing; look it up!)

How do you deal with crazy?

What drives most of us crazy are certain family members. With friends, you can eventually move on to other friendships, and that person becomes a distant, bad memory. With co-workers, you can find boundaries and some degree of separation. But with family, they stay, visit and don't ever go away! And if the family member has mental health issues or emotional problems, it can destroy a family. In time, you start thinking that you will be the next one to climb aboard the crazy train headed to nowhere. You are about to lose your mind over someone that has already lost theirs.

In this article, I am not really speaking of people that have a mental health diagnosis. When someone has schizophrenia, bipolar depression or is mentally challenged, it is a very sad situation that needs to be bathed in prayer. A caregiver can just about lose his or her mind having to deal with this person. The same answers below will probably help you.

However, I am really addressing families that have to deal with a family member who likes to stir up trouble. They aren't happy unless they are setting off emotional fireworks in the living room. The first time it happens you are shocked. You wonder what in the world brought all that on.

The next time it happens, some people feel a sense of guilt. "Did I do anything to cause this? Maybe I should not have said this nor done that." After a continual pattern of bizarre, manipulative behavior, it finally dawns on you that this person is just flat crazy!

It doesn't matter what you say or do. They are going to sew disharmony no matter what. They are bent on hurting others. They thrive off of manipulating others for their own selfish gains. They can use guilt, shame or explosive anger to get their way. People who are fairly sane, (all of us are just a little crazy you know) take a step back and just say, "Wow."

Eventually, the shock of their behavior wears off and we move into heartache. This person, as they have become older, has developed this behavior. Sometimes, this person comes into your home via marriage. Either way, your family love, harmony and peace is constantly in jeopardy when they are around. If this person is really suffering from poor mental health, your family life can become a sad, depressing, splintered group.

Sometimes it is just a dysfunctional adaptive behavior. This person has learned that they can get their way by throwing a fit, exploding in anger, sulking and pouting or screaming and shouting. It takes on many forms, but the end result is the same. They are stealing the joy out of our family.

Other times, it is a person with a borderline personality disorder or a narcissistic personality disorder with intermittent narcissistic rages and histrionics. These are just examples. There are hundreds of possibilities.

The end result is the same. There is sadness because holidays become disasters. Family members quit seeing each other or speaking to one another. And Satan is happy. I'm not saying this family member is a demon (although you may wonder

sometimes), but I am saying Satan can use people to accomplish his purposes set out in John 10:10 where he has come to steal the peace, kill the joy and destroy the Christian home.

Take heart. Greater is He that is in us, than he that is in the world (1 John 4:4). Many of my regular readers already know what I am going to tell you. But we need reminding of these things when going through something like this. We can't change others. We can't control others. We can only control ourselves and our responses to them.

These people who serve as ballistic missiles in the family probably won't go get help. They usually think everyone else needs help, so don't fight the losing battle of suggesting counseling. If they go, hallelujah!

Find ways to cope.

- **We can expect people in our homes to go by our house rules.** We can expect people to act in a reasoned way in our home free of hurting others with the tongue.
- **We may have to have time outs.** We may have to at times, remove the audience. When they fly into a rage, find other places to go and get busy. Go to a bedroom and read your Bible and pray for God to give you peace.
- **We may need to limit visits.** But you don't ever cut out people. We throw out the trash, but we don't throw out the family.
- **We can try speaking the truth in love.** Communication is really the key. When people are calmed down, we have to work out a way for us to respond together in the future. I know it is hard and difficult. But the only alternative is for the hurt to remain and all of us just struggle. Never stop seeing people. This is unbiblical. You are using this as a form of retaliatory punishment for previous hurts.
- **Don't ever use kids as pawns of punishment against another parent or grandparents.** Leave the children out of it. We must practice forgiveness and unconditional love. Love does have a way of changing even the most hostile person. However, I can love you and forgive you but the whole family doesn't have to bow down to your demands. We have to find workable ways to peaceably coexist as a family.

This article is just a brief description of a starting plan. Many other variables need to be included. Crying out to God and seeking what He would have you do is always the first and continual thing to do. Never give up. God loves you.

- 24 Hour Crisis Intervention.

The 5k in Waxahachie takes place every January. The last couple of year one of our adoptive families and their church has sponsored a 5K in East Texas. It is scheduled to take place in September.

We are aware that many of you are walker or runners; we request that you participate in one of our events.



Mentoring Rhythms

The importance of finding margin in your schedule to develop intentional mentoring relationships must be a high priority! If we value having mentoring relationships, where we pour into others, then there must be evidence. Is mentoring occurring? Can you name the person(s) that you are mentoring? Do you have a mentoring/accountability group that you are meeting with regularly? Or, and more importantly, who is mentoring you? Everyone should have a Paul in their life (a mentor) and everyone should find a Timothy (mentoree).

My good friend Scott Kirk, with Dynamic Church Planting International (DCPI), has been mentored and is mentoring others. He has planted a church and now works in coaching and mentoring church planters. He has developed some “Battle Rhythms” to ensure that you follow through on being the mentor to others that God wants all of us to be! We certainly know it is a “battle” to remain faithful and committed to intentionally and regularly mentoring others. The “rhythm” is to setting a pace that develops patterns into the normal flow of our everyday life.

First, Daily Mentoring! This is praying daily for those you mentor and asking God to do a great work in their lives, their families, and their ministries. This is about **EMPOWERMENT!**

Second, Weekly Mentoring! Everyone needs encouragement and some days more than others. A personal touch through a phone call, a text, an email, a personal note, or a visit means a lot. This is about **ENCOURAGEMENT!**

Third, Monthly Mentoring! Technology is wonderful and we are more connected today than ever before but there is nothing like being there in person sometimes. What will your monthly meeting look like? How often will you be able to get together in person? Maybe you could alternate meeting one month electronically and then the next month face to face. This is about **EQUIPPING!**

Fourth, Quarterly Mentoring! Even if the person or group you are mentoring is some distance from you it is important to schedule a day or two to get together for a retreat to take their training and equipping to the next level. This time can be used as a time to celebrate their victories and to discuss their challenges. You can use the W.I.N. coaching technique to walk them through by asking them what is going well, where do you need to improve, and what are you going to do next? This is about **ENGAGEMENT!**

Lastly, Yearly Mentoring! This time can be spent



focusing on the future and gathering together to set personal and ministry goals for the New Year. This is about **Strategic Planning!**

Here are some values you will have to protect in order to implement these “Battle” Rhythms:

- You must refuse to give in to the world’s thinking, in our culture, of individualism and the Lone Ranger mentality.
- You must refuse to make the journey alone by being committed to living in fellowship with other believers and following Christ together!
- You must always be looking for, working through and developing leaders who can significantly influence others for Christ.
- You must be committed to the biblical principle that two are better than one and that there is wisdom in the multitude of counsel.
- You must remain teachable and open to keeping Godly confidants, those that have proven you can trust them, by keeping them close to you so that they can speak into your life and hold you accountable.
- You must refuse to allow tasks, goals, work ethic, success or any personal achievement to be more

important than the people you serve and desire to encourage.

- You must develop a plan of implementation to ensure that this is not just a theory or a concept but a regular practice in the rhythm of your life!

Now it is time to get started! You must identify who will be in your mentoring group and begin investing in them. Think through what your “battle” rhythms will look like daily, weekly, monthly, quarterly, and yearly. Look for those who have a desire to be on the same path you are on and then begin making the journey together!

Healthy churches are always focusing on mentoring others as they disciple one another and grow in the Lord together!

Thoughts About Responsibility

Due to the chaos, laziness and procrastination in our society, responsibility is badly in need of redefinition. And if any group of people should be responsible, it's Christians in their walk with God.

"Look at the word responsibility—response-ability—the ability to choose your response," wrote Stephen Covey in his best-selling *The Seven Habits of Highly Effective People*. "Highly proactive people recognize responsibility. They do not blame circumstances, conditions or conditioning for their behavior. Their behavior is a product of their own conscious choice based on values rather than a product of their conditions, based on feelings."

Recognize Your Responsibility

Our actions cause consequences. Sir Isaac Newton observed there is an immutable universal law: "To every action there is always opposed an equal reaction." Good begets good and evil leads to more evil. This is one of the universal eternal, fundamental truths: the law of cause and effect.

Probably your mind is whirling like a windmill and you are saying to yourself: "There are Bible verses that teach us the same thing." Absolutely! Paul wrote to the Galatians: "*Do not be deceived, God is not mocked; for whatever a man sows, that he will also reap. For he who sows to his flesh will of the flesh reap corruption, but he who sows to the Spirit will of the Spirit reap everlasting life*" (6:7-8).

The universal rule of cause and effect existed long before Sir Isaac Newton came on the scene and it challenges every believer to be responsible for personal actions as well as serving the Lord.

However, scarcely one person in a thousand puts his or her time to anywhere near its potential good use. We stumble along in life watching the game from the sidelines. Those who make a difference in life are those who are true to themselves and others. In the end, it is we ourselves that have the greatest potential to steal our own time, talents and accomplishment. Recognizing responsibility puts us on track to greater accomplishments and service.

One of my great burdens is our lack of responsibility reaching the millions of unchurched Texans. There are approximately 26 million Texas residents and only about 18 percent attend church services on Sunday. That's down from 21 percent when I began the Mission Director's responsibilities sixteen years ago. With every church praying, leading, discipling and working, we can make a difference in the lives of many people in Texas.

Quit Making Excuses

Here are some prevalent excuses I've heard through the years that prohibits personal growth and stymies evangelism and church growth:

- We don't have what it takes.
- We are too small.
- We don't have the resources.
- We're too old.
- We're too young.
- We've never done it this way.
- We don't have enough potential in our area.
- We don't have many leaders.
- We don't want to do that.

Paul wrote, "*I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me*" (Philippians 4:13).

When we apply this truth, we can cross out all the negative excuses and replace them with positive actions.

Take Action!

Although many things in life are beyond anyone's control, we have a great deal of control over more circumstances and conditions than most of us are willing to acknowledge. Here are a dozen of the most important ones compiled by motivational speaker, Denis Waitley:

1. You can control what you do with most of your free time during the day and evening.

2. You can control how much energy you exert and effort you give to each task you undertake.

3. You can control your thoughts and imagination, channel what you think about.

4. You can control your attitude.

5. You can control your tongue; you can choose to remain silent or choose to speak. If you choose to speak; you can choose your words and your tone of voice.

6. You can control who you choose as role models, and who you'll seek out for mentoring counsel and inspirational. You can control who you spend your leisure time with—and to a great degree, with whom you communicate.

7. You can control your commitments, the things you absolutely promise yourself and others that you'll do.

8. You can control the causes to which you give your time and ideas. This is what is called the purpose behind the purpose.

9. You can control your memberships.

10. Fate is partly the hand you're dealt. You can't control that, but the correct things to achieve desired results.

11. You can control your concerns and worries—and whether you'll choose to take action about them.

12. You can control your response to difficult times and people.

Add to these actions the biblical facts that the Holy Spirit works in every believer to accomplish God's will (Ephesians 6:6) and motivates us tell everyone the good news of salvation. Write down some action steps that you will take this week—then be responsible and do them!

Sunday School Lessons

The truth of God

DATE: February 22, 2015

TEXT: John 17:1-8, 14, 17

In our text, Jesus is thanking the Father for those of us whom the Father gave to him, and how the truth of God, which was delivered by the Son, was manifest, and verified. John 17:8 says, *“For I have given to them the words which You have given Me; and they have received them, and have known surely that I came forth from You; and they have believed that You sent Me.”*

The truth of God was corroborated by the Son. Truth has no problem being tested. It loves to be revealed by the light.

When someone walks in truth, and lives a lifestyle of truth, he or she never has to look over their shoulder and wonder who will catch them in a lie. My Father gave me many brief “sound bites” as he was raising me, which I took to heart and never forgot. One of them was, “Son, if you always tell the truth, you never have to remember what you said.”

When studying about truth, it is important that we know the consequences in a life which veers from the truth. What are people’s motives for lying? (1) To cover up our past indiscretions; (2) To bolster our image; (3) to cast aspersions on others because we are threatened by them; (4) to manipulate other people, or the system to our advantage; (5) Some people just get a perverted thrill out of spreading lies.

Be assured God the Father has no need to cover up anything in His past; He has no need to bolster His image, because He is the great “I AM.” No image is higher, and no one else can aspire to it. He has no need to destroy or manipulate the system or others, because He created “the system” and humanity, and is infinitely superior to all other creatures, hence not only does He deem untruth

as evil, He never has a need to resort to it. In fact, He cannot resort to it, because He cannot lie. Titus 1:2b.

Our lesson today is “The Truth of God.” God the Father doesn’t just know the truth; He doesn’t just speak the truth; He doesn’t just advocate that His children live in truth; but the fact is, He is the truth. He can no more tell a lie than the sun can project cold. He is the truth – and that truth is no less embodied by Christ and the Holy Spirit.

Among His many attributes in our lives, the Holy Spirit, according to John 16:13, will “. . . guide you into all truth.”

When Thomas asked Jesus how the disciples could “know the way.” Jesus’ retort was, *“I am the way, the truth and the life: no man cometh unto the Father but by me.”* John 14:6 He doesn’t just know the truth, He is the truth. He is also the way and the life. He assures Thomas of being able to be followed.

In stark contrast to truth, the scripture tells us Satan is the father of all lies. He is the inventor of the lie, and has modeled it in many forms. In the garden he delivered his first lie against God — *“Ye shall not surely die.”* he said trying to entice Eve to partake of the forbidden fruit, which God had already said consuming it would lead to spiritual death. Satan also delivered the first “half truth” when he told Eve that, upon partaking of the tree, *“ye shall be as gods, knowing good and evil.”* He led her to believe she would possess all the deity of God, but left off the truth of “spiritual death.”

Satan is also the inventor of all profane babblings which are spawned from a lifestyle of lies. Paul exhorted the Ephesians to refrain from “filthiness, foolish talking, and jesting.” Jestings is a smooth way to degrade an individual to his or her face with a double entendre, which could sound complimentary, but is really

slandrous. Paul says such language is “not fitting.” But there is a language which is “good to the use of edifying. . . and will minister grace to the hearer.” Ephesians 4:29. That’s the truth of a Holy, righteous God.

The truth of God ministers, builds up, soothes, and reassures. It can be trusted 100 percent. In His personal ministry on earth, Jesus’ every word was truth and it ministered grace. Even in His rebuke, He exuded love, mercy and grace. Is it any wonder people sat on the edge of their seats, for hours, on a hillside in a blistering desert heat, hanging on His every word?

Jesus Christ, Who embodies truth, ministered to people with it. He likewise calls His children to do likewise.
