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## A homegrown pastor

Traditionally church pulpit committees tend to believe a man must live hundreds of miles away before he is qualified to come serve as their pastor, but Antioch Missionary Baptist Church near Gilmer has taken exception to that tradition.

Antioch is not on a major thoroughfare—in fact, it seems rather remote—being located on the narrow county road called Giraffe Road. Built into the bend of the road, the church has a sprawling, well equipped plant and paved parking that many churches in town would envy, and they are poised for a great future of outreach and growth.

Sometimes God chooses to tap a homegrown man to be pastor in his home church—including relatives. Antioch gained such a pastor in 2015 when they extended a call to Michael Pool, who along with his wife, Kirby, was raised in the church.

“Not only am I pastor of the church I was raised in, but my dad and father-in-law are deacons in the church,” Pool said, noting that the arrangement is working well.

Pool was saved, and called of God to the ministry and Antioch can thank God that He used them in the process.

“I was called to the ministry at the age of 19,” the pastor said. “God had dealt with me for several years while being active in the church and Galileans, and during a revival in our church. I just couldn’t deny it anymore.”

Pool noted that his perceptive pastor, the late Larry Lansdale, who was Antioch’s pastor for many years, sensed his troubled spirit.

“Bro. Larry called me into his study—this very study we’re sitting in now, and just simply asked me, ‘Michael, tell me what’s going on.’”

It was soon after that encounter



A Zoom meeting was held with the officers, department directors, auxiliary leaders and production team of the BMA of America as well as Richard Smith, host pastor of the 2021 BMA of America Meeting Jan. 12. The purpose of the virtual meeting was to discuss the feasibility of holding the national meeting at the regularly announced time in April 2021.

The decision to move forward with hosting a physical meeting of the national association in April 2021 was made the third week in October 2020. Since that time, things have changed. I may take a different route to get where we all want to be, but I assure you that in time, we will all get there. ## How to fund your church building project

So, your church has decided to build. Congratulations! At this point, you probably have a lot of questions, not the least of which, how do we pay for it?

when Pool surrendered his life to the Lord in the gospel ministry in 1998. The church licensed him a couple of weeks later, and for the next eight years, he served the church as minister of youth.

He resigned the position and he and his wife, Kirby, two sons, Eli and Ethan and their daughter, Elyssa, joined Enon, Gilmer, not too far from Antioch. Later, the family returned to Antioch, and in 2015 he was called to be Antioch's pastor.

In response to the question about the benefits of a man being pastor of his home church, Pool said, "I already know the people, and where they live and I sat under the teaching of many of them in years past. As the new pastor, I was able to hit the ground running and knowing where all the people lived made it easy. I know what they believe and they know what I believe. So, the learning curve simply wasn't there."

Although Pool is into his sixth year as pastor, he is quick to acknowledge that it is his first pastorate, and he still has "a lot to learn."

Pool has had the best of all worlds—being raised in a loving family, and in a loving church that called him to be pastor, and attending Harmony School where he enjoyed the influence of school superintendent and also a BMA pastor, Dr. Ray Thompson, who was pastor of Enon, Gilmer for nearly 50 years, and Bro. Charles Johnson, another longtime pastor of Rosewood, Gilmer, who has taught at Harmony while serving as a pastor.

"I have known Bro. Michael all his life," said Johnson. "Our daughter Mary Ann Mauk and Michael and his twin brother, Jeffrey, attended Harmony Schools K-12, graduating in 1997."

Johnson taught Pool as a student in Junior High, and he observed that, as a result of growing up on a farm, he developed a strong work ethic, and saw him carry these laboring principles into the ministry.

"Michael faithfully serves his church as a 'real' pastor—he is the real deal," Johnson said. "He strongly supports the associational work of the BMA at all levels, and is currently serving as the moderator of the Liberty Association. His strong support and involvement in our associated work is why I chose to nominate him as a vice president of the BMA of Texas."

Pool said his first year saw a great number of baptisms and additions to the church, and the growth continues. The church gained a new family this month.

Iglesia Bautista Nueva Vida Mission, led by BMA Texas Missionary Jaime Garcia, also meets at Antioch. Jaime, his wife, Gloria, and their eighth-grade son, Isaac, moved to Gilmer three years ago from the Houston area, coming from a Baptist church in Splendora. Jaime and Gloria speak very little English, but Isaac speaks fluent English, and is also a student at Harmony School. Isaac said there are around 25 youth, both Hispanic and Anglo, that meet on Wednesday nights in the recently completed youth activity building.

# SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSONS

## Lasting treasures

DATE: Feb. 7, 2021

TEXT: Matthew 6:19-24

### THE HOOK

The following is a quote from C.S. Lewis. He said, “The Christian says ‘creatures are born with desires. A baby feels hunger—well there is food; a duckling feels the need to swim—well, there is water. If I find in myself, a desire, which no experience in this world can satisfy, then the most probable explanation is that I was made for another world.’”

Often we humans pursue possessions, position and prestige, thinking it will satisfy. But eventually we discover all this is for naught. But to pursue God, and to lay up treasures in Heaven means that your satisfaction and fulfillment is realized in Him. And that satisfaction is not temporary—but for eternity.

### THE BOOK

**Earthly treasures are subject to the elements of nature (vv. 19-20).** No one will knowingly purchase a car that has been directly exposed to salty air of the coast, because it will rust and corrupt the metal. I recall a day when we went to bed in Gary Texas, and left the doors unlocked, and the keys in the car. But no more. All our earthly treasures must be under lock and key and protected from the elements. But such is not a problem in Heaven.

**Regard for treasures indicate the desires of the heart (v. 21).** It is not a sin to possess things on earth. Dr. and Mrs. W.A. Criswell owned a fortune in rare antiques acquired from all over the world. But they did not hesitate to auction all of them off to help raise funds for a building program for their church. That was very telling as to where their true treasure was. Corrie ten Boom famously replied in an interview, when asked about the subject of possessions, “I have learned to hold

onto things loosely.” One cannot find fulfillment in laying up treasures in Heaven if they clutch earthly possessions tightly.

**Regard for treasures indicates the spiritual stability of a person (vv. 22-24).** If the eye is single (meaning singularly focused—not double-minded) then the body is full of light. The person is “walking in the light” (1 John 1:7). James says, “. . . a double-minded is unstable in all his ways.” No one can serve two gods.

### THE LOOK

This lesson behooves us to examine our lives, to see if we are driven by a desire to satisfy the flesh and to acquire the things of the world—as opposed to seeking first the Kingdom of God, and His righteousness. My favorite Christian rap song, performed by Toby Mac, is based on Mark 8:36, “For what shall it profit a man, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul?”

## How to combat worry

DATE: February 14, 2021

TEXT: Matthew 6:25-34

### THE HOOK

Possibly the most ungodly act a Christian can commit is to worry. I hesitate to make this following statement, because it brings such conviction, but when we worry, we are, in effect saying, (1) “The weight of the world is on my shoulders.” (2) God is not able. If you believe the weight of the world is on your shoulders, you have an extremely elevated opinion of yourself; And if you say “God is not able,” you have an extremely diminished opinion of God.

### THE BOOK

Worry causes misguided priorities (v. 25). Worry causes us to focus more on things than life.

God illustrates the folly of worry through his lower creations (vv. 26, 28 and 30). He cites fowls of the air for food, lilies of the field for clothing, and the brevity of life in the grass of the field.

God explains that His children are not to be like the heathen (vv. 32-33). A godless heathen only knows to seek after clothing and sustenance in the energy of the flesh, but God has instilled into His children, the divine ability to seek His kingdom first.

God teaches us to not borrow trouble from tomorrow (v. 34). Someone once said 90 percent of things we worry about never come to pass; about 7 percent more things we worry about, it is not within our ability to take proactive measures;

only a tiny, minuscule amount of things that happen to us, can we prevent. The apostle Paul said in Philippians.

### THE LOOK

Paul said it well when he wrote, “Be careful for nothing, but

in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known unto God.” In other words, don’t worry about anything, but pray about everything with a spirit of thanksgiving in your heart. Then, turn it over to God, Who is well capable of handling it.

### THE HOOK

This will probably be the shortest hook we have ever presented which is certainly not original; it has probably been overused, but yet appropriate. And it's this: "Point one finger at someone and three fingers are pointing back at you." This seems to be another way to word what Jesus told His disciples to do in Matthew 7.

### THE BOOK

**Some inequities when we judge others (vv. 1-2).** I want to refer to a couple of Matthew Henry's descriptions of one who judges others. He said, "We must judge our own acts but not make our word a law to everybody." He calls this text in Matthew 7, "...a reproof to those who quarrel with their brethren for small faults, while they allow themselves in greater ones." Judgement eventually comes to those of us who uses a different standard to judge others, and who forget—or refuse to acknowledge God the Father as the only Righteous Judge.

**The hypocrisy of judging others (vv. 3-5).** "And why beholdest thou the mote that is in thy brother's eye, but considers not the beam that is in thine own eye?"

Why do we have such a keen vision and insight into the faults of our brethren, while oblivious to our own. I suggest three possible motives:

- Judging others bolsters our self-image if we can highlight the sins of others.
- Judging others, we think, deflects judgement from others toward us.
- Judging others often indicates a secret sin in our own lives.

**the futility of judging the debauched (v. 6).** Godly counsel and reproof are valuable within the framework of the New Testament church when the object of the reproof is teachable and humble. Some are not only non-teachable, but also tend to become enraged at reproof, which indicates a hardened heart and prideful spirit. Dogs and hogs are used as the illustration here because they considered unclean creatures. Hogs return to the mire. Dogs return to their own vomit. Godly counsel is holy as the metaphor of the pearl indicates. But when

a person is hard hearted and debauched, it is an act of futility to give godly counsel—to cast pearls before swine.

**The merit in petitioning God's throne in prayer (vv. 7-9).** God loves a persistent prayer warrior. The indication in verse 7 is to "keep on seeking and knocking." Verse 9 gives us an indication as to God's response to our petitions, saying essentially that He will not give us something harmful, degrading or grotesque when we petition Him. He compares those answers to what our own children's petitions are to us. The Father delights in giving those good things to His children whose hearts are right (Psalm 37:4).

### THE LOOK

Jesus is not instructing us to refrain from counseling our brethren. Quite the opposite, He said in Matthew 18 that we are to go to brethren who have committed an offense against us. In verse 15, the phrase, "If he shall hear thee..." indicates that the recipient of the confrontation, which is delivered from a heart of love, has a receptive spirit, and will mend his ways.

## Choose wisely

### THE HOOK

The subject of the "broad way" as opposed to the "narrow way" was illustrated graphically to us during Christmas when we drove to Ennis to see acres of Christmas lights, blinking in sync with Christmas music on FM radio. The show was wonderful, but the rural road was filled with potholes, and was too narrow to negotiate the heavy traffic. I wished for a giant, paved parking lot, overlooking the scene. That would have been much more convenient, than to fight traffic to get a parking place in a ditch.

### THE BOOK

**The narrow way is hard (vv. 13-14).** When one confesses Jesus as Lord, and believes in their hearts that God raised Him from the dead, they are placed on the way to Heaven. One does not work to obtain it (Ephesians 2:8-10). But the proof of that genuine faith results in one's negotiating that hard road to Heaven. If one chooses a life of debauchery, indifference and worldly, sensual pleasures, while refusing the hard road (like persecution, difficulty and sorrow) then it is indicative that genuine conversion did not happen. But one

who confesses Christ, receives the bumps and bruises of that hard road with grace, and a song in the heart.

**The lifestyle of the person on the narrow way is revealed (vv. 16-19).** Jesus uses the illustration of plant life. Figs do not come from thistles—grapes do not come from thornbushes. Neither does a genuine believer come from false teaching. The stability, peace and wisdom of a person living in the narrow way is quite a witness to a world headed for destruction.

**The detractors from the narrow way are revealed (vv. 20-23).** Through deceit and sleight of hand, false prophets feign miracles - claim to cast out demons and promise prosperity. They know enough biblical verbiage to deceive one into thinking they are godly when they are not. They lead one to death as Jim Jones led hundreds of people to death at the 1978 Jonestown massacre. False prophets deny the incarnation of Christ because they possess the spirit of antichrist. They do not wish abundant life for you, but somehow they seem to live "abundantly."

**The contrast between true believers and false religionists (vv. 24-28).** True believers act on the precepts of God's Word and live by them. Although still living in fleshly bodies and tempted to sin, true believers are quick to run to God when they sin—and quick to confess sin. True believers

have genuine wisdom -- the lost deny God, and are described as fools in Psalm 14:1. This is illustrated in the stability of the wise man (built house on the rock) as opposed to the fool (built house on an unsubstantial foundation).

### THE LOOK

1. The child of God has a resource within to guide him or her through the storms of life and from temptation.

The fool "washes out" in the midst of them. I implore you to choose wisdom—choose Christ.

2. The "narrow way" is not heavily populated ("few there be that find it.) But the "broad way" is jam-packed with people condemned to eternal torment in hell.


