Jacksonville College trustees elect Lightner as president

The Jacksonville College Board of Trustees voted unanimously to elect Dr. Joe Lightner as the next president of the college April 29. Dr. Lightner has been serving as the college's vice president for executive affairs. The current president, Dr. Mike Smith, who has served the college for the past 10 years, is excited about handing the mantel off to Dr. Lightner.

Smith said, "Dr. Lightner is highly qualified and experienced to lead Jacksonville College to the next level. The best days are ahead for Jacksonville College with Dr. Lightner as president."

Lightner and his wife, Rebekah, have two daughters Hannah (15) and Julia (12).

"The Lightners understand that they have been called to serve here for such a time as this. We

welcome them and look forward to watching how the Lord will guide them in leading our college into the future," said Donnie Page, chairman of the board of trustees.

The president-elect has a distinguished background in growing churches and serving as an executive leader in parachurch ministries. He holds a Master of Divinity from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, a Doctor of Ministry from Liberty University, and will complete a Doctor of Philosophy in Biblical Ministries from Midwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. He also has a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration from the University of Arkansas and business experience that has strengthened the ministries he has served.

Lightner will serve as president-elect under

Smith until July 15, 2021. At that time, Smith will hand over the responsibilities of president to him.

In speaking of his vision for the college, Lightner said, "God draws students from all over our region, state, nation and world to Jacksonville College for a quality education and spiritual transformation. The college has always had a vision to capture the minds and hearts of students for Christ, a vision that I will faithfully steward."

He added, "Jacksonville College is a special family of students, alumni and friends whose support we need to step into the big vision God has for our future. The immorality of today's culture is a reminder of the importance of Jacksonville College's vision to reach students who will engage the culture for Christ."

How to find a pastor

So, your pastor has resigned. What do you do now? I'm glad you asked!

Messengers at the 2020 Baptist Missionary Association of Texas Meeting gave *Baptist Progress* approval to offer workshops, training opportunities and other resources to pastors, church staff and churches. As a result of their decision, *Baptist Progress* has developed a *Pastor Search Team Manual* for pastor search teams and will also be providing training to potential interim pastors in August.

There is a common myth among our churches that there aren't any available BMA pastors. Again, that is a myth. It is not true! It is this editor's opinion that churches just get in too big of a hurry to find their next pastors and might not know where to turn for help when a vacancy occurs.

Some, including Larry Barker, who heads ACTIVATE for the BMA of America, have suggested that a church's best option is a smooth transition from one pastor to another. By all means, if the resigning/retiring pastor has time to stay and guide the church in seeking its next pastor, then he should. But what if that is not a possibility? What then?

The next best option would be to schedule different speakers to fill the pulpit for the period of about one month. BMA department directors are a great choice to fill a church's pulpit during the first month after the pastor leaves.

In the meantime, the church could contact *Baptist Progress* to request the name of a potential interim pastor. As stated above, sometimes churches get in too big of a hurry to find their next pastors. It is better first to elect a trained interim pastor to lead the church in addressing issues that need to be addressed before the next pastor arrives on the field.

Even when the interim pastor is elected, the church should still wait 30 to 90 days before it begins its search for a permanent pastor. The church's strengths and areas of challenge need to be identified, assessed and recommendations should be made by an assessment team to address those areas of challenge.

Finally, when it is time to find the next pastor, a church, under the direction of the interim pastor, should elect a pastor search team. The pastor search team may choose to follow the *Pastor Search Team Manual* provided by *Baptist Progress*. The manual provides a step-by-step plan for the pastor search team to follow. By all means, the interim pastor should serve as a consultant to advise the pastor search team throughout the process.

The pastor search team should then place advertisements for a pastor in all BMA state association newspapers, including *Baptist Progress*, *Baptist Trumpet* (Arkansas) and *Mississippi Baptist*. Churches may also place their advertisements on the website of the BMA of Texas, bmatexas.org. The advertisement should be worded, "First, Anywhere, USA is seeking a pastor (specify full-time or bivocational). Send resume to (provide mailing address and email address)."

At that point, candidates will begin sending their resumes to the church. However, the pastor search team should keep in mind that the team is not just a "resume-collecting" committee and is

not limited to choosing the next pastor from resumes that have been submitted. The pastor search team is just that—a "search" team. Therefore, the search team should contact as many BMA department directors as possible to ask if they are aware of potential candidates as well as ask church members for the names of potential candidates. There might be a pastor currently serving in another BMA church who is being led of the Lord to move to a different church.

Another consideration for the pastor search team is to look within its own church. There might very well be a man, called of God to preach, who is serving as a faithful church member. John MacArthur has stressed in his writings that sometimes the best candidates for a pastor or a church staff member are those who are homegrown—already members of the church.





Jacksonville College hosts reception for president and other faculty

Following spring graduation ceremonies, Jacksonville College hosted a reception for retiring president Dr. Mike Smith, retiring vice president for academic affairs/academic dean Marilyn Welch, former vice president for executive affairs Dr. Blanton Feaster, and President-elect Joe Lightner at Central, Jacksonville May 8.

In honoring Smith, who was elected president of Jacksonville College in 2011, Lightner listed a few of the outgoing president's accomplishments during his tenure including his successful oversight of infrastructure, expansion of the college's athletic program and the purchase of additional property. Lightner also noted that over 100 students have come to know Christ as their personal Savior and Lord during Smith's presidency.

Lightner presented Smith with a Bible from the college and Donnie Page, chairman of the board of trustees, presented other gifts to the president. An announcement was also made that the Dr. Mike and Susan Smith Servant Leader Scholarship has been established at the college. Fabiola Hernandez was named as the first recipient of the scholarship.

In presenting a gift to the Feasters, Smith spoke of the blessings God gave him in bringing Feaster to Jacksonville College as vice president for executive affairs in 2016. He shared how Feaster was used of the Lord to relieve him of a lot of stress and that he had a servant's heart, always willing to go above and beyond the duties of his office. Feaster resigned last year to accept a position with Dallas Baptist University. The college was not able to honor him upon his resignation due to the COVID pandemic.

The president also praised Welch for her excellence in handling the academic affairs of the college as she served as vice president for executive affairs/academic dean. He said that she was the person for the job when the college needed a new

dean. Jodye Jay, who is the registrar for the college, has been named as the new vice president for academic affairs/academic dean.

Lightner will become president upon Smith's official retirement date, July 15. See the front-page article of this issue concerning Lightner's election.

Smith has purchased a travel trailer and plans to serve as an interim pastor wherever he is needed. Welch will continue to teach at the college.



BMA of Texas Office Building flooded

Changes in the way TBHC does ministry

Many may know and understand what foster care looks like today. Child Protective Services (CPS) has played a large role in the past several decades and has shaped many of the child welfare improvements. Is it perfect? No. However, Texas legislation serves as the legal means to try to improve a social service that is broken at its best.

God has entrusted kids to the work of believers. That is why the state struggles to accomplish its goals.

James 1:27 reminds us that we are not only to do social work, but we are also “to keep ourselves clean from the world.”

Our relationship with CPS has changed a lot of the way we do ministry. This has not always resulted in the most positive outcome for TBHC. But, through the years, it has forced us to focus our attention on children, knowing there are needs all over our state. But God placed us here.

Due to the structure of our system and the intentionality of our heritage to be a place for children, we have focused on being a place for kids. You will notice that even our campus is not reflective of days gone by. Our cottages exist as homes for foster parents, no longer are they group homes, nor do they staff of our agency. Every family that serves as a foster parent also works another job in addition to the calling to care for kids.

As you come and visit us, know that just like anywhere else, we don’t have the kids line up to be viewed. They are


in school, doing homework, playing and/or visiting their biological families. The confidentiality of photos and names of our kids prevent us from sharing the details of their life with you.

A previous resident of the Home, W.B. Carraway, tells a story about C.B. Stanley, “...the manager had carried several of the Home’s ‘orphans’ for the people to see and hear. He was letting each ‘orphan’ get up and tell the folks a bit about himself.”

Why don’t we bring them all over the state for you to see? It is because sometimes there are exceptional circumstances that put a child in danger. Sometimes their parents are in an active criminal investigation. Sometimes the state removes them because someone is threatening that child’s life. Understand that we are not being suspicious of our donors. We are protecting our children.



Attebery announces resignation as BMA Foundation executive director

Charles Attebery has announced his resignation from the role of BMA Foundation executive director effective Aug. 4, 2021. He assumed the role in 2014 after serving as Lifeword's development officer for three years. In 1985 he was named vice president for institutional advancement at Central Baptist College then president of the college, where he remained until 2004.

A native of Bearden, Arkansas, he surrendered to the ministry in 1969 then pastored churches in Arkansas and Texas, where he and his wife, Janice, currently reside near their son Scott, his wife Meredith, grandson Bryce, and two step-granddaughters, Emma and Maggie.

"It has been an honor to serve the Lord and BMAA churches as director of BMA Foundation, but after much prayer and consideration, I have determined that it is time for me to step aside. God is well able to call men from out of godless surroundings and into the gospel ministry—while He also calls those who were born into a ministry environment, and taken to Sunday school every Sunday from infancy.

Eugene Gauntt was one such minister whose legacy continues to live on through his children and grandchildren. Gauntt, a World War II veteran, surrendered his life to the gospel ministry while attending the national encampment at Latham Springs in 1953. After attending Jacksonville College in 1954-55, he served the pastorates of Valley, Neches; Shady Grove, DeBerry; First, Gary; Anthony Drive, Ennis; Dellwood, Midland and his final pastorate, Union, Springtown. God called him home just seven months after he accepted Union. But his longest tenured ministry were the years from 1967-1980 when he served as the first full-time director of Daniel Springs Encampment, Gary.

His eldest son, Paul, followed in his footsteps, surrendering to the ministry in 1967 while directing music at Corinth, Jacksonville.

“I can honestly say it had to be God Who called me, because neither my folks, nor much of anybody else encouraged me,” Gauntt said.

“That night I made my call known at Corinth, and afterward, I drove home to Gary and found my folks taking a late night swim in the camp pool and I shared the ‘good news’ with them.”

But Gauntt said his parents were not encouraging, nor overjoyed over their son's surrender.

“Years earlier, my dad tried to encourage me to consider entering dentistry—I received absolutely no encouragement from them to enter the ministry. All my mom said was ‘well son, the pastorate just isn't what it once was’. But when they finally realized it was serious with me—they switched into the ‘encouragement’ mode, and became some of my most ardent ministerial cheerleaders. I often thought later that they might have been ‘playing the devil's advocate’ in order to test me.”

Gauntt added that his brother, Jack, and his family remained faithful to the Lord in His church and are active in the Grace Community Church in Tyler; and his sister, Lauri Cain, and her family are faithful in Farley Street, Waxahachie.

Paul served in music ministry in Gulfport, Mississippi; Fairfield and Dallas before entering the pastorate in 1975 at Enon, Iola. His other pastorates included Colonial, Lubbock; College Heights (now University), Nacogdoches; Eighth

Avenue, Teague (founding pastor, Gauntt's great grandfather, J.W. Hamilton) and First, Palmer. He also served the BMA of Texas as director of the Department of Church Ministries in Waxahachie for 16 years. From 1969-71, he served in the chaplain's office on a U.S. carrier and was given many opportunities to preach and direct music aboard ship.

Paul and his wife, Carolyn, had twins, Randi and Derek, in 1981 while in Nacogdoches. At almost exactly the same time, Doug and Lucinda Loafman, were about to complete their degrees at Stephen F. Austin in Nacogdoches. The two couples' paths never crossed at that time. The Loafmans had three sons, Matthew, Caleb and Micah. It was years later when the providential hand of God directed Matthew's and Randi's paths together at Austin Bank in Jacksonville where she was employed. Matthew was on the Jacksonville High School coaching staff. As a result of some shrewd logistical tactics by Deena Brand, they met, fell in love, married and from that union has come six boys and two girls—Lexi, Luci, Luke, Levi, Landry, Lane, Layton and Lincoln.

Today, Matthew and Randi are both teaching in public schools in Waxahachie. Matthew teaches history and economics and is soccer coach at Waxahachie High School. Matthews parents have worked in the public school, and Doug has not only coached, but served as minister of pastoral care at First, Moore, Oklahoma and also served Central, Livingston as associate pastor.

God the Father ordered Matthew's steps in ministry as well—and as such, Eugene Gauntt's granddaughter became a preacher's wife. Matthew has served as teaching pastor of Lakeside, Trinidad; First Missionary, Cleburne and for the past two years, has been pastor of Central, Lancaster. Loafman believes strongly that the call to the ministry of Jesus Christ is a call like no other.

“[The call] is most often not sought after by man, but by God who chooses the man,” Loafman said.

“Many times, one is going about his own life, pursuing his own dreams, when suddenly the Lord rips all that away, and leads him down a path never expected.”

Loafman says that he is fortunate to have come from a long line of coaches who were also bivocational pastors.

“My father and grandfather spent many a day in both the gym and the pulpit and always displayed the sermons they preached in the games they coached,” he said, noting that he personally had been more bent to the athletic pursuits of life.

“I was determined to be a head football coach, and by the spring of 2012, at the age of 29, I had nearly made it there, and was already being interviewed for head positions at the 5A level in Texas, but as the Lord continued to draw me to himself, and my family continued to grow, my views on what was important changed,” Loafman said.

He was asked to fill in for a preacher for two weeks while he recovered from knee surgery, and 10 years later he has pastored three churches.

“More importantly, I have pastored a wife and 8 children in my own home,” he added.

“It had become clear that, while we need good coaches, it is of the greatest importance to have men who are willing to stand for the gospel of Jesus Christ. I did not say we have a shortage of pastors—they are a dime a dozen, but actual preachers who will not muddy the glory of Christ for a cushioned life or for the sake of keeping deacons happy. I pray that I might be useful to His kingdom in some way, and may God give us courage and humility and continue to raise up uncompromising men.”

God has also blessed Derek with an incredible singing voice and gift for leading God's people in worship. In the years that he and Christine and their three children, Knox, Nixon and Naomi lived in Colorado, he was kept busy serving as worship leader and interim worship leader in various churches in the Denver area. Today, he is serving on the praise and worship team with the Avenue Church of Waxahachie and its' satellite congregation in Ennis.

“Growing up in a preacher's home, I learned a lot about ministry, about loving the Lord and what that looks like,” Derek said.

“I learned how to love people genuinely and how to worship in full spirit and truth. I'm blessed to have gone all over the state and other states with my dad to churches where he would fill the pulpit. I would sit there and listen to him and then go to the back of the church and shake hands with people.”

Today Derek says that ministry is all about showing the absolute love that Jesus has for us through his leading in worship each week.

With a total of 7 grandsons, Paul and Carolyn often entertain the idea of the possibilities of that ministry tradition continuing on through a fifth generation—and even further. Only the Father knows.

BMA of Texas hosts prayer retreats for pastors

The second of hopefully many prayer retreats was held May 4-6 at a retreat center near Tyler. Todd West, Pastor Connections Coordinator for the BMA of Texas (funded by BMA Texas Missions), led in the retreat, and says he has found that limiting the meetings to a few, seems to be more effective. For three days, attendees enjoyed each other's fellowship and connected while studying God's Word, cooking and participating in recreational activities.

West explains that participants need to find a place of total seclusion, and in a location that fits into his or her personal life. The objective is to encourage one to spend much time alone with Jesus. During their time together, participants are encouraged to focus on ministry, relationship with God, family and one's own personal health.

"One goal in these retreats is to encourage pastors in their relationships with God," West said. "Too often, we preachers just study to preach rather than to study to have a closer relationship with the Lord."

Participants met at Mercado's Mexican Restaurant in Tyler at noon for lunch, and afterward, drove to the retreat venue—Savannah's at the Flyin' H Ranch, north of Tyler near Red Springs. The attendees included Donny Sadler, church restart pastor of Impact @ Bethel, Dallas; Collin Jones, pastor of Red Springs, Tyler, and also a part-time employee for the Savannah Ranch; Tim Alba, church planter with The Bridge, Seagoville; Gary Southard, church planter, Church at Valley Ranch in Houston; Ronnie Mills, church planter Kingdom Chapel, Saginaw and Nick Bumgardener, pastor of Mount Olive, Scurry.

West explained some of the details which gave him a special burden for pastors.

"Pastors have been a big part of my ministry—Paige and I have traveled a lot in a seven-year period, and a lot of my ministry involved sitting with pastors in living rooms. One evening, the Lord just laid it on my heart to try to help pastors," he said. "I would rather be with you guys tonight than to preach to a crowd of 500 people. I value the time we are spending together, and for the remaining years that I may have, I want to spend much time encouraging, coaching and helping pastors."

West cited some alarming statistics of pastors dropping out of the ministry.

"Did you know that today, in our country, 50 guys left the ministry," West asked the group.

He also cited the need to follow Jesus' personal ministry as the example.

"Jesus felt the need to be alone with His Father," West said.

"Jesus also knew when to say 'no' to demands and requests. We pastors cannot be everything to everyone. If we follow that pattern, we are going to find ourselves running on empty."

West also wants to encourage men to build a strong prayer life, noting that they will find that God will do amazing things when they sit at the feet of Jesus in prayer.

Each participant had his own fully equipped, rustic log cabin, and enjoyed plenty of relaxation, interaction with brethren, fishing, shooting at the firing range and soaking up the beautiful east Texas scenery. The ladies from Red Springs, Tyler provided meals for the group.

West encouraged the group to choose accountability partners and interact by phone, or text concerning what the Lord is teaching them throughout the next 40 days.

The men who attended the retreat were highly complementary.

"I had never been to a pastor's retreat before, but it has been great getting around pastors and finding out we're all going through the same thing," said Gary Southard. "I have learned the importance of not only praying for everyone else, but for myself as well. I've also learned that if we must give attention to our own spiritual lives if we expect to minister to others."

Nick Bumgardener said that the retreat was a godsend because he was able to withdraw from some of the chaos of life.

"This will certainly help me make it through some of the dark times of life," he said. "We need to find time to cling to God and never give up on Him because He never gives up on us. I think ministry is going to look different now, but that's okay because I believe I'll be following God closer than ever before."

Collin Jones, said he had not realized what he had been missing all through the years by attending the conference.

"The fact is, I had been focusing on ministry more than on God," he said. "This retreat has really been a breakthrough for me."

What are ChangeMakers?

BMA Global Missions values multiplication and considers what God is doing in the nations as its highest goal. The New Testament pattern of multiplication is encouraged and evidenced in the primary areas of disciples, leaders and churches. For those who have obeyed the command of Christ to practice Great Commission missions, there is no greater personal joy and no more accurate measure of ministry than when we pour our lives into others and they repeat the process! In missions lingo, this is called “indigenous missions.” The word *indigenous* simply means that something originates and belongs locally.

In BMA Global Missions we call these leaders ChangeMakers. A ChangeMaker is an indigenous believer who, most of the time, has been won and discipled by a BMA missionary or another ChangeMaker and now carries out the ministry of go, disciple, plant, and repeat in their own country. Currently we partner with over 400 ChangeMakers globally.

The biblical examples of “ChangeMaker missions” fill the pages of the New Testament and are especially visible with Jesus and his earthly ministry with the twelve and Paul in his church planting efforts. Some of the principles for ChangeMaker missions can be found from Paul’s words in Colossians 4:7-15:

⁷ *Tychicus, a beloved brother, faithful minister, and fellow servant in the Lord, will tell you all the news about me. ⁸ I am sending him to you for this very purpose, that he may know your circumstances and comfort your hearts, ⁹ with Onesimus, a faithful and beloved brother, who is one of you. They will make known to you all things which are happening here.*

¹⁰ *Aristarchus my fellow prisoner greets you, with Mark the cousin of Barnabas (about whom you received instructions: if he comes to you, welcome him), ¹¹ and Jesus who is called Justus. These are my only fellow workers for the kingdom of God who are of the circumcision; they have proved to be a comfort to me.*

¹² *Epaphras, who is one of you, a bondservant of Christ, greets you, always laboring fervently for you in prayers, that you may stand perfect and complete in all the will of God. ¹³ For I bear him witness that he has a great zeal for you, and those who are in Laodicea, and those in Hierapolis. ¹⁴ Luke the beloved physician and Demas greet you. ¹⁵ Greet the brethren who are in Laodicea, and Nymphas and the church that is in his house.*

Paul is in prison and concluding his letter to the churches in and around Colossae. This passage is the ending of that letter, and he is greeting many in the Colossian churches in the name of some on his missionary team. It is in the names of these team members that we have a great opportunity to look into Paul’s multiplication ministry and see foundations for ChangeMaker missions.


ChangeMaker missions is based on outside partnerships that are the scaffolding, not the building. We certainly seek to enter partnerships with indigenous believers who are doing Great Commission ministry and especially those who are the fruit of our own missionary efforts. However, we do recognize that these outside partnerships are temporary, like scaffolding. They are

intended to give support and structure until the permanent building (ongoing local ministry) is ready, then we take our scaffolding and go build in another place. Paul was a great leader, not because he got things done, but because he got things done through others! He had no intention of building his own private empire in any place; it was all about building the kingdom of God through the multiplication of disciples, leaders, and churches.

ChangeMaker missions is based on passing the baton, not paternalism. Historically, many involved in global missions talked much about passing the baton of ministry to indigenous leaders but rarely followed through. Paternalistic actions where one “partner” dominates the other was more of the norm. In Colossians 4, Tychicus, Onesimus, Epaphras, Luke, and Demas were all Gentiles while Aristarchus, Mark, and Justus were Jews. These men were from a myriad of places and backgrounds, but Paul’s aim was always the same: win, disciple, equip, and release into ministry around the known world. Paul really did not have to “pass” the baton because he included them from the beginning.

ChangeMaker missions is about lives changed by the gospel who are now repeating the process. Tychicus was the missionary mailman who delivered many of Paul’s epistles. He did this in spite of great personal peril in travel and deep personal sacrifice. Onesimus was the thieving runaway slave from Colossae who, according to history, later became the pastor of the church at Colossae. Epaphras started the church in Colossae; Luke was the beloved physician who wrote the books of Luke and Acts; Aristarchus was with Paul in riots, imprisonments, and shipwrecks.

Their stories were altered by Jesus and now they were sharing the story to the known world. That is ChangeMaker missions.

Why Christians need the poor

Proverbs 21:13

In spite of all our relief and help programs, the poor are still among us. The battle of poverty goes on and on. Most of us, the world would say, are among the winners. But what should Christians do about the poverty of others?

Recently, the country was told by the Census Bureau that more than one in every 10 Americans must be considered poor. Overseas, the conditions are even worse. "The World Food Council tells us that a third of the children in the world die of malnutrition and disease before they have five birthdays."...Time Magazine.

"Each year 100,000 children go blind because of lack of vitamin A in their early diets"...Chicago Tribune report.

WHY DO WE HAVE THE POOR?

Why are things like that still true today? The Bible seems to say that God allows the poor among us to test our compassion for our fellowmen. Do we really love the poor? Our response to poverty reveals our attitude.

Some have wrongly assumed that to be poor is a sign of God's disfavor. That is not true. God loves the poor and hears their cry. He sees and judges those who wrong them in their weakness (Psalm 14:6, Psalms 107:41).

The Word teaches us that God will bless those who reach out to help the poor (Psalm 41:1). On the other hand, we invite God's judgment if we ignore the needs of the poor (Proverbs 21:13). We, as Christians, cannot ignore the poor.

HOW CAN WE HELP THE POOR?

The real question is "how"? Governments contend that we should find some way to redistribute wealth and thus wipe out all poverty. Christ taught that we should share. But nothing in Scripture suggests that Christians can or should change the world's economic structure. In Mark 14, Jesus clearly taught that poverty goes with this present evil world, when He said, "Ye have the poor with you always."

Christ's principle of ministry to the poor is that it be done from a heart of genuine compassion. He would say (on the Sermon on the Mount), "When, not if." And that it should be done without glory and fanfare. Such sharing demands awareness of need.

Anyone willing to work was assured of food to feed his or her family. The Old Testament story of Ruth and Naomi tells us that they obtained gleanings in the fields, where grain was deliberately left for that purpose. In New Testament times, the duty of giving alms was acknowledged and encouraged. Jesus often spoke of giving to the poor.

Widows without family support were cared for by the church, as seen in Acts 6:1 and I Timothy 5:9, 16. Paul mentions the poor in Galatians 2:10, "...that we should remember the poor." Christian churches and God's saints have always been His channel of mercy to the poor.



WHY SHOULD WE HELP THE POOR?

First, the presence of the really poor prompts us to exercise compassion. How selfish and self-centered we become when we think just of ourselves and just of our own (1 John 3:17).

Second, the presence of the poor gives us opportunity to prove that Christ has touched our hearts and made them new. Our old sin nature prompts us to look the other way. Compassion is an evidence of an inner work of grace. James spoke of faith and works. Our Acts are proof of faith.

Third, the poor give Christians opportunity to lay up heavenly treasure (Proverbs 19:17).

Fourth, there is a practical side to helping the poor. The church is to be concerned for the poor among its members. Namely, those with inadequate food and housing, sickness which brings great financial crisis, children in need of clothing, someone who needs desperately to see a dentist or be fitted with glasses, etc.

It may be your opportunity to minister, perhaps your chance to win a blessing. Jesus said, "Freely ye have received freely give."

Our first and great obligation is to share the Bread of Life—salvation. But we cannot withhold the bread of Material Aid to those who truly have a need.

God please let us be Good Samaritans!

From no hope to new hope

The people in Ukraine believe they have no future because they have a “God void.” Therefore, they have no hope. They just exist from day to day, going about life as if it’s a drudgery. Larry and Tammy Wood spend their days in Ukraine trying to offer the people hope—the hope that can only come through God’s Word and Jesus Christ.

The Woods have spent over the last two years in the country, learning the language and helping organize churches. They had a plan, but so did God. Needless to say, God showed them how much better His plan was. They had hoped to organize a church after many months. Instead, God worked things to get the Water of Life Baptist Church going by November of 2019, just after three months on the field. Within a year that group averaged 65. A second church plant, Grace Church is also moving along. God’s timeline is faster than the Wood’s.

You may wonder how the work is growing so fast. Well, besides the fact that God is obviously in it, the Woods use the concept of teaching the English language to gain the confidence of the people. At first, they were able to teach in person, as they had done many times before on mission trips. Now, however, due to the pandemic, they have to use the virtual teaching over the computer. They also gain help with learning the language there, spending two to three hours a day in a coffee shop studying and making friends with the ones who come in. They have learned a most important lesson to “wait on God.”

In Ukraine, “Christian” simply means being part of the Orthodox Church. Yet, many don’t even know who Jesus is. Sometimes the people ask Tammy or Larry for “help” and what they mean is “prayer.” They don’t understand all the concepts of Christianity that most of us grew up with. It usually takes about three years for a person to move from being interested in the gospel to being a follower of Christ in Ukraine.

The Wood family came home on furlough during the pandemic of 2020. In that time, they also got the corona virus. Besides causing health problems at the time, it also slowed them down some. They returned to find the work was continuing. Now they are back for a brief stay for family reasons. The Sunday before they left was Easter Sunday in Ukraine. That was May 2, 2021. Seven members were baptized into the Water of Life Baptist Church in Lutsk that day. Larry and Tammy are excited to see what happens while they are away as the new believers trust Jesus to give them new hope in Him.
