

2022 BMA of America Meeting concludes in Springfield, Missouri





Messengers of the churches of the Baptist Missionary Association of America (BMAA) gathered in Springfield, Missouri April 18-20, 2022. On the first evening of the meeting, the Honorable John Ashcroft, who served as governor of Missouri, United States Senator and Attorney General of the United States, welcomed those in attendance. In keeping with the theme of the meeting, Preach the Word, BMAA President, Clif Johnson, pastor of Garrett Memorial Church, Hope, Arkansas, preached a message by the same title.

Tuesday's sessions included the election of BMAA officers for the 2022-23 associational year. Elected were the following: Clif Johnson of ▲ The Honorable John Ashcroft Arkansas, president; Charles Johnson of Texas, first



vice president; Gary Longstaff of Missouri, second vice president; Greg Medenwald, Jerome Cooper and Randy Shepherd, recording clerks.

New churches petitioning the association were the following: Immanuel, Littleton, Massachusetts; StonePoint, Cummings, Georgia; Connection Point, Jonesboro, Arkansas; Midway, Batesville, Mississippi; Cain, Van Buren, Arkansas; and Redeemer's Love, Houston.

BAPTIST PUBLISHING HOUSE

Each BMAA department and agency director gave reports for the departments

and agencies. Dr. Charley Holmes, who served as interim executive director of Baptist Publishing House reported that within the first year of his overseeing the department, Baptist Publishing House gained secure financial footing. He shared that it was time for a new executive director to be elected and encouraged messengers to elect the department trustees' nominee, Jordan Tew, who served as his assistant. Tew, former pastor of Eighth Street, Grand Prairie, was elected as the new executive director.

agency of BMAA, encouraged messengers to observe the National Day of Prayer, May 5, 2022, and to receive an offering for Moral Action June 26 or July 3, 2022.

DANIELS SPRINGS

Jason Prewitt, director of Daniel Springs Baptist Encampment in Gary, spoke of the various uses of the campground, including summer camp for children and youth, conferences and retreats. He also provided information regarding 2022 camps.

MINISTERS RESOURCE SERVICES AND BMA FOUNDATION

Dr. Steve Crawley, director of Ministers Resource Services and the BMA Foundation, reported that a feasibility study will be undertaken to consider the possibility of merging the two ministries.

Donny Parrish, director of Lifeword, reported that plans are underway to expand the ministries media efforts by adding more languages in order to reach more people-groups with the gospel. Also, he spoke of how exciting it was that technology allowed him to meet on a regular basis with Lifeword personnel around the world in one setting.

BAPTIST MISSIONARY ASSOCIATION THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

Dr. Charley Holmes, president of Baptist Missionary Association Theological Seminary spoke of how the COVID -19 pandemic caused a change in the way students receive their education. Since the pandemic began, more students are simply attending seminary classes online. It is the president's hope that reality will reverse as he believes one receives a better education in person with professors and fellow students in the same learning environment.

COORDINATING COUNCIL

As the result of this editor's motion, "That the Coordinating Council consult with the arrangements committee, the enrollment and finance committee, and the director of conference ministries to determine a more efficient and effective way to plan and carry out the annual meetings of the Baptist Missionary Association of America and present recommendations to that effect at the Association's 2022 annual meeting," that was presented and passed at the 2021 BMAA Meeting, the Coordinating Council brought forth several recommendations.

Recommendations to dissolve the BMAA arrangements committee and assign

A word from your Missions Office




THE GIFT IS RECEIVED BY FAITH.

I'm just sayin'

In 1925, the orphanage faced incredible financial hardship. Mrs. Dove was given help in the form of her husband's election to lead in the fundraising efforts. He brought a lot of experience and background to his new responsibilities. Mrs. Dove continued to lead in the running and oversite of the children in care. The challenges that they faced continued to grow. Debt grew, needs grew and gifts of support declined.

Matthew 6:25, Jesus said that we were not to worry about what we eat or wear. Helping us understand that, God supplies needs so we can count on His provision. Is this an indictment on the Doves? Discouragement is also expected in our walk with Christ, as the Doves saw the needs and the lack of response around them to the circumstances of the children in their care. I'm sure that this scripture came to mind repeatedly. And if I were them, I may have felt guilty of worrying about how we were going to provide for the dire needs of the kids for whom we cared.

But see, Jesus called us to more than the needs of this life; it is the needs of eternity. Yet, just as the Doves spoke of the earthly needs of kids in their care, they knew that meeting those needs helped children understand that God wanted to meet deeper needs in their lives. Because Jesus also said in Matthew 25:40 that if you see someone in need and serve them it is as though you did it for Him.

The Doves were so discouraged, and when they left, Mrs. Dove said, "I have given eight years of my life to the care of the Home, and I will leave in a short while, worn out in body and mind, in debt to the bank and to others for borrowed money that is owing me for my work here. We are humiliated for our own business failures and yet we are not responsible for it. We have not complained, we have gone on with our duties from day to day, faithful to the needs of the hour; hoping for a better day, paying out what little came in on the food for the children to keep them from suffering. I plead with you in God's name, rally to the support of your new force of employees and give them your prayers and your financial support in a way that they may be made stronger day by day

Such great discouragement they must have felt to look back on their work and not see accomplishment but failure. I wonder if they could have seen what they were walking through as part of the grander story would they have felt different? To know that God was shaping and preserving through hardship. Would we all see life different if we saw things the way God does?

Psalms 103:11 says, "For as the heaven is high above the earth, So great is his mercy toward them that fear him."

God is overseeing all we do. His story is being told. And you and I are a part of that story. The legacy of the Doves is that they helped preserve TBHC for future generations and helped kids they had in their care. I hope when we meet in heaven, I can tell them that their impact allowed future generations to know Jesus.

When following the Lord sometimes we enter seasons like the Doves. Let me encourage you today to hold tight to Jesus who will supply all your needs. Trust and obey for there's no other way to be happy in Jesus but to trust and obey!

Thank you all for helping TBHC continue to be a place that cares for kids even when things get hard or look hard, we know we can hold tight to Christ and because believers know seeing those in need and helping is serving Christ.

Focus for BMAA 2022—Preach the Word

In these latter days, there is great evidence of the return to the pure, unadulterated preaching of the infallible Word of God as was demonstrated and proclaimed during the sessions of the 2022 BMA of America meeting in Springfield, Missouri.

Dr. Clif Johnson, president of the Baptist Missionary Association of America, and pastor of Garrett Memorial Baptist Church of Hope, Arkansas, opened the series of messages preaching from 1 Timothy 4 on the subject, PREACH the Word—Preach THE WORD. Johnson noted the difficulty many pastors experience by losing their focus on the task before them because of discouragement.

Clif Johnson He also emphasized the



gravity and urgency of the ministry of the prophet in the New Testament Church.

"God's primary vehicle for communicating with mankind is through mankind, particularly the prophet," Johnson said. "As Moses began to prepare people to go into a new land, he also prepared them for his removal from leadership because, as you know, he was prohibited from crossing the Jordan entering the Promised Land with the nation of Israel, so the natural concern for the Israelites at that time was 'if you, Moses, are not going to be able to communicate to us what God is saying, who are

Johnson noted that Moses answered the anxieties of the people by listing in Deuteronomy chapters 16-18, four sources of authority for them—judges, kings, priests, and prophets.

"Out of these authoritative positions for the nation of Israel, the role of prophet is regarded as the most crucial because God promises to put His words into their mouths, so they would speak to His people," he said.

Johnson referenced other prophets in the Old Testament, including Nathan, who stared King David in the face and boldly proclaimed, "you are the man," exposing the kings adultery and murder and cover-up in 2 Samuel chapter 12.

"This proclamation through God-called men as God's chief means of communicating is not only found in the Old Testament, but is maintained in the New Testament," Johnson said. "The believers in the New Testament found themselves in a similar situation as the Israelites when it was known that Moses was not going to cross the Jordan river with them, because Jesus was ascending back to His Father, so now who were they to listen to? But just as God gave the command to listen to true prophets, so too, God gives the church preachers who proclaim the revealed Christ in the apostolic message through the power of the Holy Spirit."

Church planter Pastor Jason Goodwin, of the Covenant Baptist Mission in Jones County, Mississippi, dealt with the subject of The Sufficiency of the Word, using 2 Peter 1:1-8. He said the Word of God is not just simply there to inform us (concerning) how we are to live, but it directs us in how we are to live." Goodwin said, "We must take this word very seriously."

He noted that the sufficiency of God was the first truth that was attacked in the garden when the serpent slithered up to Eve and said, "Did God really say. . .?"

"Do we really believe that 2000 years ago when it was given that it still applies and in A Jason Goodwin our culture and in our context



today, or do we, as some claim, that there are other means, other messages, other ideas that we should listen to?." Goodwin asked.

"Now we may say as BMA Baptists that none of us would affirm that, and yet, just like Eve buys into the subtlety of the serpent's temptations so we subtly buy into the temptations of the world, our culture—instead of preaching the word, we find ourselves preaching politics; instead of relying on the gospel, we find ourselves forcing morality—instead truly trusting that the Lord will work through His word to redeem Himself a people, we try all kinds of tricks and traps. We may be very well intentioned—who doesn't want to see a world at peace? Who doesn't want to see more people come to Christ as Savior and Lord, and follow Him in baptism?—But do we trust the Word to do the work? Do we think that by standing up and saying, 'thus saith the Lord' and read it and giving the sense of His Word will truly accomplish (His will)"?

Goodwin said, "Brothers and sisters, it's very simple, if we believe that the Word of God is truly sufficient, then we believe that it is sufficient for all of life and godliness."

The annual message was delivered by Richard Smith, pastor of Farley Street Baptist Church, Waxahachie, with his subject being, Preach the Powerful Word, using his text, Ezekiel 37, emphasizing the truth that God sometimes directs His prophets to go to a hopeless situation—like the valley of dry bones—and preach the Word.

"God gives Ezekiel a vision that is worse than a civil war Arichard Smith battlefield," Smith said. "A



sea of dry, scattered disconnected bones scorched by the sun - Ezekiel must have shuddered at the grizzly scene not just because he was a priest, and forbidden from touching a human corpse, but because of God's Holy law, bodies that were left unburied was a sign they had fallen under God's curse (Jeremiah 34) And this gruesome scene is a picture of the most hopeless situation a nation could ever encounter. This is a vision of the most irredeemable

beyond hope situation ever imagined."

Pastor Smith said God told Ezekiel that the dry bones are the whole house of Israel. Although hope seemed to be gone, God reveals to the prophet that he is someday going to restore Israel to their land and make them spiritually alive.

In Ezekiel, we learn that God wants the man of God to see the true state of mankind; He wants the man of God to know Him and to make Him known; He wants the man of God to preach as He commands, and God wants the man of God to pray in the Spirit, as commanded.

"The fact that Israel exists today, should reveal to us that God is Lord of all, and the one true God." Smith said. "There is nothing that He can't do, including restore and return a nation that for all practical purposes, should be dead and extinct."

Exodus 14:4 says, "Then I will harden Pharoah's heart, so that he will pursue them, and I will gain honor over Pharaoh, and over all his army, that the Egyptians may know that I am the Lord."

Smith added, "As odd as it may seem, we often come to know God the most intimately when we are faced with difficult times, difficult leaders, people, and yes, even difficult governments."

Then he noted, "We cannot breathe love into our marriage, or health into our bodies, or obedience into our children, or passion into our churches, morality into society, any more than Ezekiel could breathe life into those dead bones-but I know Someone who can - and I know Someone Who wants to - but we have to be willing to pray and we have to be willing to preach the Word."

The final message was All the Word to All the World, Matthew 28:18-20, by Johnmichael Poulin, missions coordinator for South America and South Africa. He emphasized that the Great Commission was given to the every New Testament church.

"Our doctrinal statement states that our mission is to evangelize sinners, and that mission was given to the local, autonomous New Testament ____ Johnmichael Poulin Church," Poulin said. "We are



to come beside our other BMA churches and encourage each other to evangelize the world. Missions is our mission."

"All these ministries, brotherhoods, WMA, sound literature—all exist to help the church to carry out the Great Commission," Poulin said.

He said, "We are to partner with other local, autonomous churches, but I don't see that the authority to carry out the Great Commission was given to every believer, in and of themselves. Her mission is to evangelize sinners by preaching the gospel, baptizing those who believe, and maturing them by instruction and discipline."

"The Bible knows nothing of a Great Commission

MA Missions and its missionaries and churches share one common goal: Make God's glory and love known to every tribe, tongue, and nation. It's the heart of our association and the focus of our first value statement:

We are motivated by the Mission of God.

Making him know to all peoples wherever they are in the world is our passion. Some live in far corners of the world in isolated villages where Jesus' name hasn't been heard. Others live in urban areas, planting churches that reach both local peoples and international expats with the gospel. Every missionary's ministry is different, but individuals and families serving the BMA share a zeal for proclaiming the good news.

Another shared characteristic is our caring support of missionaries as they navigate the good and bad days of ministry. The heart and focus of Missionary Care is to come alongside our missionaries with the aid, encouragement, and support necessary to carry out God's Mission.

Missionary Care also prepares, equips, and ministers to BMA missionaries so they can be fruitful in both life and ministry. This vital ministry exists to serve our missionaries as they serve others. We're invested in caring for their spiritual, physical, and emotional needs because they have invested in caring for the needs of others. Missions Executive Director Dr. John David Smith describes our care team as "missionary medics" to those serving on the front lines.

This ministry of care has made a difference in the lives of BMA missionaries since it began several years ago under the leadership of Jerry Kidd, a legacy missionary and former director. He was assisted by Sarah Hebert Hamilton whose experiences as a missionary to the Philippines burdened her to encourage missionaries. They coordinated several regional conferences for BMA missionaries to worship, fellowship, and encourage each other. Attendees still tell stories of their impact.

Conferences are a central part of Missionary Care's ministry efforts. A mini-conference was offered in the fall of 2020 to missionaries who were stateside and unable to return to their fields due to pandemic travel restrictions. An online soul care conference was produced at the Global Missions Center in Conway to be shared this spring with missionaries on the field. Using conferences to connect missionaries through worship and fellowship remains a goal of Missionary Care.

In addition, Missionary Care provides other essential services for our global workers like counseling, coaching, and prayer support. We offer assistance during each missionary's deputation period, departure, and furlough but also their permanent return to the States. During this reentry process, we offer debriefing and counseling to process their experiences and prepare for a healthy transition.

We are developing procedures to help missionary kids prepare for college during their senior years if they choose to return to America. If families have a specific need, we connect them with trained professionals. Whether it is helping with a vehicle during furlough or connecting them with a midwife to deliver their child in remote regions, we work hard to meet needs.

During the pandemic, BMA Missions provided a new level of care. A team was assembled to check on missionaries weekly and ensure their safety and well-being. An Asia-Pacific missionary heard from a missionary colleague serving with another sending agency that he felt alone during the pandemic because no one reached out. The BMA missionary shared that this was not the case for her family because Missions office personnel and churches remained in contact, making them feel loved and valued. Testimonials like this remind us that Missionary Care makes a difference in their ministries.

We are motivated to support and care for our missionaries who work tirelessly to proclaim the gospel and advance God's kingdom. They are passionate about making God's glory and love known to the world and the reason our churches are faithful to support, encourage, and pray for them.

May we all be motivated by God's mission.



OPEN DOORS AND CHURCH PLANTS

aptist Medical Missions International is the humanitarian/ benevolent arm of BMA Missions. The primary purpose of this ministry is to provide humanitarian aid or assistance for many nations of the world where care is needed because of economical, geographic, or disaster reasons.

BMMI is opening doors for BMA missionaries to plant new churches and make new disciples for Christ all around the world. Many churches and individuals partner with us to serve with missionaries. The main goal of BMMI is to assist pastors and missionaries in meeting people in their communities. Many people come out to a medical clinic to receive healthcare, but our prayer is that they leave with more than just a few pills. We want them to leave with hope, the kind that comes from knowing Christ.

During our clinics, local pastors and missionaries set up an evangelism station that each patient goes to as a part of our rotation. Here they are introduced to Christ, to the local pastor, and to the church.

Hear from BMA Missionaries Stan and Donna Scroggins about how BMMI has impacted their lives both as volunteers serving with medical missions and also as missionaries on the field:

"We always knew how important Baptist Medical Missions International (BMMI) was to the local people who received medical care through this ministry. Stan and I started traveling with BMMI back in the 1990s. As a nurse, I relished using my skills alongside doctors and other medical

professionals to provide care otherwise unreachable to the desperately poor around the world.

"Not until we began serving as full-time missionaries in the Philippines did I understand how important BMMI would be to us as BMAA international missionaries.

"Living in the Philippines has afforded us

a ChangeMaker missionary planting a church. While part of that team we met an American Filipino who was born and raised on the island of Leyte. She asked us to check on her village of Tigbagwan in the mountains around the city of Maasin. That was four years ago, and now there is a vital mission church in that village.

MORE GROUNDBREAKING FOR LIFEWORD

ifeword Executive Directors Harold Morris, A.R. Reddin, and Paul Bearfield, Sr. were incredible visionaries in their time, remaining on the cutting edge of technology throughout their tenures. Now deceased, they could hardly have imagined where that technology would take the media ministry.

Bro. George Reddin, who served as Lifeword executive director from 1986 to 2011, had the foresight to lead the association to purchase what is now the BMA Global Missions Center. His vision for the studio part of the building was a media production center for audio and video content. Instead, the area originally intended for video production was used as a warehouse for both BMA Missions and Lifeword.

Through the years, however, the world became increasingly video centric with more and more shows and other projects produced from a small

studio. In 2017 Lifeword moved into Internet ministry, which meant the introduction and production of video content plus a redesign of Lifeword's audio production studio to be used for video.

Thousands of video content hours were shot in that small production area. Millions of hours of Lifeword video content have been consumed on the Cloud and social media pages. As the need for video content increased, more studio space became increasingly important until finally there was no more production room.

Director of Operations Luis Ortega says, "It is humbling that the Lord allows Lifeword to come alongside the local church in making disciples of all nations and to play a role as 'the vast crowd, too great to count, from every nation and tribe and people and language' prepares to stand clothed in white robes in front of the throne before the Lamb."

After years of praying and planning, Lifeword recently broke ground for a warehouse at the back of its present facilities. After that project's completion, the ministry will reclaim the present warehouse facility for the purpose it was originally intended: a video production area. This studio expansion allows Lifeword four times more video production area and more gospel programming.

"What an exciting time for the ministry of Lifeword," Executive Director Donny Parrish says. "The expansion of our television suite will give us four to five times more production floor space than we have now. We need this room to produce more video content to reach more people, and at the same time, this will allow our sister ministry, BMMI, to have more room for shoebox efforts."

This expansion is a huge leap of faith for Lifeword. Please pray that God will provide the resources to complete this project and use the content produced to make His name more famous around the world!

Hispanic church—Mensajeros de la Verdad—finds a place to call home

David and Letty Lopez, who have been members of Farley Street, Waxahachie for 25 years, had a burden to begin a Hispanic work. The burden came to fruition when the first public service was held Jan. 19, 2006, in one of the larger Sunday school classrooms in the old Farley Street location, and the Mensajeros de la Verdad Mission (Messengers of Truth) was born. In those beginning services, the

congregation had Sunday school, and then moved chairs around to prepare for the worship service.

"The first family that came to us was Gustavo and Maria Rodriguez, and they are still with us," said Letty. "Maria and the kids were the first ones that started coming and then later, Gustavo joined them and they've been with us since then—very faithful—we just love them."

Due to the sudden and unexpected sale of the Farley Street property in 2006, the church moved to a temporary location as its new facilities were being constructed. The Hispanic congregation moved with them, but because of an issue with classrooms in the temporary facilities, the Hispanic group met for Sunday school and worship in the gymnasium of the Texas Baptist Home for Children until the first phase of Farley Street's new Brown Street facility was completed in November 2008 and the mission resumed meeting in the new Farley Street facilities.

With a vision for Mensajeros de la Verdad Mission to someday have their own place to meet, Lopez was excited to learn that the former First, Bardwell property might be a possibility.

He said, "When I saw that the Bardwell church was available, I talked to Heith [Mitchell] and we went to see the church, and I liked it, and from that point, about three to four weeks, we were making our plans to move there."

Their first service in the church was a praise and worship service held on Good Friday, April 22, 2022, from 7 p.m. until about 2 a.m. Their first official service was Sunday, May 1, 2022, with the majority of the congregation moving to the Bardwell location.

"We had between 30 and 35 people in attendance on the first Sunday, and there are more that are interested in coming," Letty said, noting that several church members that have family in the Bardwell area said they had already contacted them and they want to come visit. "Bardwell has a lot of Hispanic population and we've got a lot of work to do out there."

They have plans to do some much needed repairs on the building including leveling it, and doing other remodeling, both interior and exterior and getting ready for their grand opening.

Eddie Ballard, who had led the church for the past five years, shares his heart and the heart and emotions of the First Baptist Church as they have relinquished their property for the purpose of making way for a new church:

"After more than 128 years of Bardwell Baptist Church (FBC) faithfully serving the Lord, the members brokenheartedly agreed that the time had come to stop meeting as a church. This church faithfully ministered to the Bardwell community from horse-and-buggy days to the day of space travel. One of my most precious memories was on the next to the last Sunday when I was privileged to baptize a young mother while her four-year-old son stood on the stage at the foot of the baptistry, surrounded by the faithful members of the church. It was a sad but uplifting final Sunday in the life of the church. The compelling contribution of Bardwell Baptist Church will live in the lives of those touched by the ministry of this precious church over this long and blessed history, and her influence will continue in the lives of the generations who follow. It was my privilege to be pastor of Bardwell Baptist Church for the faithful members who were there to the very end."

Heith Mitchell, BMA Texas Missions Director, weighed in on the new church in Bardwell: "It's been a joy for years to get to know all the senior adults that were over at FBC Bardwell—such sweet people," Mitchell said. "They recognized that their community was becoming predominantly Spanish-speaking, there was no Spanish-speaking engagement and there was a need. They had told me for some time that they were going to leave their building to a Spanish-speaking church. So, it has been a joy for BMA Texas Missions to assist them in that and we are so thrilled to see Bro. David and the new church there in the new building and we just expect God to do amazing things. It's always a joy to serve the Lord by serving His people."

Lopez' vision for the future is to reach all the community around Bardwell, Ennis, Avalon and Italy. They are planning to expand parking and make other necessary repairs to the building. Lopez expresses his appreciation for all who helped in the start-up of Mensajeros de la Verdad.

"I want to give thanks to all the staff at Farley Street, Bro. Richard, and all the people who have been helping us all along," he said. "There's no word I can say to express my appreciation—we are very grateful."

David, a native of Durango, Mexico, and Letty, a native of El Paso, have two grown daughters; Debbie, and Cyndi — and grandchildren, Zach, Alexandrea, Benjamin and Ryan. Along with being a missionary-pastor, David drives an over-the-road truck.

Farley Street, which is no stranger to church planting, having provided property and first-phase building, planted Heritage, Waxahachie in 1986, in conjunction with the state missions department. Farley Street will continue to participate in the development of Iglesia Bautista Mensajeros de la Verdad by lending support and equipment. First, Desoto has donated a sound system to the new congregation, and Farley Street's Gorginho Sousa, who is the media director and sound technician for Farley Street will install the sound system.

Bro. Richard Smith, who has been pastor of Farley Street Baptist Church for almost 30 years, expressed his excitement about the church acquiring their own facility.

"We are very excited to be planting this new church. Pastor David and his wife, Letty, have been members of our church for over 25 years," said Smith. "Several years ago, David became burdened to begin a Hispanic ministry. The Lord has blessed and this past year they doubled in attendance. We hate to see this sweet group of people go, but we know God has great things in store for them."

being carried out devoid of local churches," he said. "Every time we see these stories in the book of Acts who are they being written to?—local churches. The stories being told are members of local churches that are carrying out this Great Commission that God has given us."

"What is the role of our association in the Great Commission? Our role is very simple—we come alongside local churches and we assist them in their missions endeavors. Our missionaries in the past, has historically understood this."

He cites the book by beloved past pastor, BMA Seminary president and interstate missions director of the BMA, Dr. John W. Duggar. In his book, *The History of the BMA*, Dr. Duggar wrote, "One of the remarkable things about the BMA of America, from its inception was the prevailing harmony and good will among churches, ministers and laymen. They repeatedly said, 'Missions is our mission.'"

"The reason the BMA exists is to help local churches take all the word to all the world," said Poulin. "I think of the byproducts of our association—the fellowship among ourselves. I so enjoy coming to our national meeting to get to meet with friends I haven't seen since the last national meeting, and to get to hear the reports, and that fellowship is sweet. I think about the fellowship in our brotherhood, the WMA and all of the other ministries we have in the BMA, but that fellowship is not why we exist. We have that fellowship so we can develop strong bonds to help sister churches in their missionary efforts."

Poulin said included in the fellowship inside the BMA, is of us keeping ourselves pure doctrinally, via the schools and seminary, which exist to help our churches teach their pastors and members how to observe all things.

Poulin shared five truths concerning the mission of BMA churches as they take the gospel to the world:

The BMA does not have to be perfect to take all the word into all the world. He cites one of those imperfections as being different positions many of us have on certain interpretations of scripture, which are not specifically spelled out in the doctrinal statement.

The BMA is to take all the word to all the world, because the One Who has all the authority has told us to.

The BMA is to take all of gospel to all the world, and not just the message of salvation.

"Please don't misunderstand me—the gospel message is the greatest message of all time. It is the message God uses to save us—but the One who has all authority has commanded us to do more than just preach the gospel—but to make disciples. [The Commission] does not say 'make converts and leave them' but to teach them all Christ has commanded us."

The BMA is to take all the word to all the world, not just to those who look and act like us.

"The Great Commission tells us to go make disciples in all people groups."

The BMA is not alone as we take all of the word to all of the world. "Behold I am with you always, to the end of the age."

This summer's quarter of the *Baptist Expositor* is titled, *Blessed Deceivers*, and will be an in-depth study of Genesis 24-36.


